Attendance & Punctuality

So far this year, our whole-school attendance has been absolutely fantastic, with each week improving on last year's figures. We have also seen a significant reduction in term-time holidays. Thank you for your continued support in helping us improve attendance across the school.

One area we still need to focus on is punctuality. We understand that road closures, bin lorries and traffic can sometimes make arriving on time difficult. However, arriving late means children miss the start of lessons, which are carefully structured to build learning progressively. Even a short amount of missed time can add up over the year and have an impact on progress.

The Importance of Punctuality

Did you know?

If, on average, your child is 10 mins late to school or just one lesson every day, they will miss the equivalent of 32 lessons over the course of the year.

Our lessons are structured to build on learning; missing 10 mins of learning can have a significant impact on progress.

1. Set a Realistic Budget

There are plenty of free or low-cost events in Teignbridge over the festive period — from school fairs to community activities. These can be a great way to get into the Christmas spirit without spending much.

5. Don't Feel Pressured
