## What do you know about absence?

Parents / carers are legally responsible for ensuring their child receives an education, suitable to their age, ability and needs? *True or false?* 

**TRUE**: not always through attendance at school, but is always monitored if Education Otherwise.

If you have 80% attendance at the end of the year, it means you will have missed:

- a) 20 days
- b) 40 days
- c) 65 days

40 days

If parents / carers send a note in, the reason for absence will be authorised. True or false?

**FALSE**: It's at the discretion of the Head teacher. E.g. Some Head teachers may request medical evidence to support regular/prolonged absences due to illness, other circumstances are judged on merit.

Parents could receive a penalty notice if their child doesn't attend school regularly, which includes taking holidays when it has not been agreed. *True or false?* 

**TRUE**: 3 ways to get Penalty Notices:

- 1. unauthorised holiday either unrequested, or unauthorised by school in full, or child not returned to school on the agreed date
- 2. continued unauthorised absence as part of EWO casework– 20 sessions in a 12 school week period
- 3. truancy patrols being collected on two occasions within a 12 month period, with absences coded as unauthorised by the school

How much will a penalty notice cost a parent / carer?

- a) £25
- b) £60
- c) £120

£60 per parent per child for first 4 weeks Rises to £120 per parent per child if unpaid, for further 2

If unpaid after these 6 weeks - court

On average, a primary pupil misses a minimum of two and a half weeks per year. *True or false?* 

**TRUE** 

If a child takes a two-week holiday, their attendance at the end of the year can't be more than 95%. *True or false?* 

TRUE, especially for May collection of figures!

Most absences in Leicester City are caused by extended family holidays. True or false?

**FALSE**, although commonly misconceived.

Dealing with absence is the responsibility of the headteacher.

True or false?

**FALSE** – Head teacher has ultimate responsibility for coding and following up absences, but parents legally have a responsibility to ensure their child attends school (S444 Education Act 1996). Teachers, mentors, EWOs etc can all play a role in promoting attendance, and when this is happening, best outcomes are achieved!
