Helping Children to Manage their Emotions

Anger management in children: how parents can help

Why is my child angry? Advice for coping with anger issues in children and young people from our team of experts.



Everyone gets angry or frustrated. It's a build-up of feeling when something's gone wrong. While it's a normal emotion to feel it can be unpleasant to be around. Anger issues are a top mental health concern for children contacting Childline. With many of children turning to Childline for anger issues support each year it's understandable to worry about what's happening and why. The NSPCC has therefore created some ideas and resources for parents to help you find ideas you can try to help you cope.

Staying Safe with Fireworks



As the fireworks season approaches, the night sky will be lit up with fireworks displays. With all the sparkle and excitement, it's easy to forget that fireworks can be dangerous if not used carefully and responsibly.

The Child Accident Prevention Trust have shared some top tips to keep us safe while celebrating.





Using fireworks at home?

If you decide to use fireworks at home. here's how everyone can stay safe.

Only buy from licensed sellers

Check before you buy. Make sure you buy fireworks from a licensed retailer, both in-store and online. Do not buy fireworks from unknown retailers on social media sites. It's illegal for anyone under 18 to buy or carry fireworks.

Store fireworks safely

Store fireworks in their original packaging. Lock them away from children and animals. Keep fireworks dry and away from sources of heat

Check your timings

Did you know that you can't let fireworks off between 11pm and 7am? The only exceptions are Fireworks Night, when the cut-off is midnight, and Diwali, New Year's Eve and Chinese New Year, when it's 1am. Timings may be different in Scotland. Search 'fireworks' on gov.scot for more advice

Be considerate

People and animals may be affected by fireworks. Let your neighbours know in advance if you're planning on using any fireworks. Be mindful of where you site fireworks to minimise disruption.

Look after pets

Cats and dogs should stay inside. Give small animals who live outside lots of extra bedding and nesting material to burrow in.

Read all the instructions

The box of fireworks will tell you important things like how far away people need to stand back once the firework is lit. If you don't understand the instructions and warnings, don't use the firework.

Dispose of fireworks safely

Ensure that fireworks are out, soak them in water overnight, then put them in a rubbish bag and in the bin.

Which fireworks can I use at home?

Category information can be found on the label.

Category F1, F2 and F3 fireworks are on sale to the general public. Consumer fireworks will fall into either category F2 or F3 depending on how much of a **safety distance** is required. Check ou have enough space to safely use a firework before you buy. Always follow the Firework Code www.saferfireworks.com

Ready, Respectful, Safe - that's how we do it here!

All children in our school interact with many different adults during their day. Adults in our school think it is very important that all the adults have the same expectations and that we are consistent in our approach. For this reason, we have developed 3 rules that all adults will remind children of: *Ready, Respectful, Safe.*

- 1. 'Ready' Ready is the right time, right place and the right attitude. Readiness for all things including being ready for learning, ready to listen, ready to go to lunch etc.
- 2. 'Respectful' Respectful is caring for ourselves, other people and our environment. When people are respectful, they are showing respect to their peers, to adults, to their environment, to themselves.
- 3. 'Safe' Safe is taking actions that look after myself and others. Being safe at school leads to everyone feeling safe in the learning environment, safe with the people around them and safe in the activities in which they are taking part in.

When everyone works together in a community;

- We feel happy, safe and valued.
- We can all reach our shared goals.
- We can all be the best version of ourselves that we can be.
- We can all fulfil our potential.

As part of our PSHE lessons this term the children have been talking about our whole school rules of being ready, respectful & safe and have created some posters to help us all to remember.
