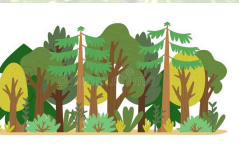

Year 2 visit the mosque



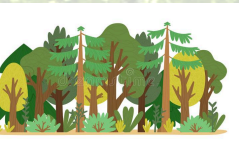
Last term, Year 2 paid a visit to a mosque in Hull. It didn't look like a religious building - it looked more like a house!

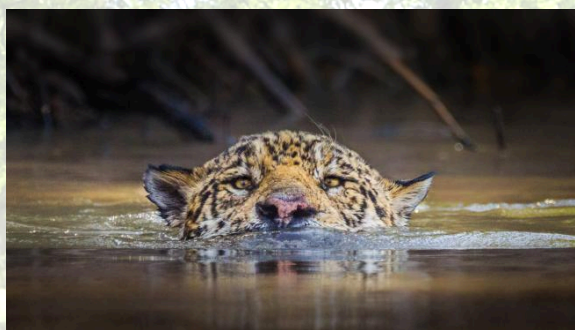

Their fur is usually tan or orange with black spots, called "rosettes" because they are shaped like roses. Some jaguars are so dark they don't seem to have spots.

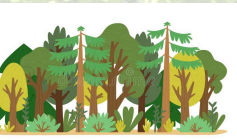


Five Fascinating Facts:

Ingredients

200g golden caster sugar
200g unsalted butter softened
plus extra for the tins
4 large eggs
200g self-raising flour
2 tbsp cocoa powder
1 tsp baking powder
 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp vanilla extract
2 tbsp milk

To decorate

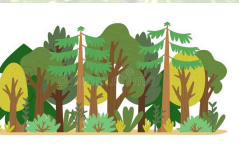
100g milk chocolate chopped

'Surprised!' is a well known work of art from Henri Rousseau. He used oil paint on canvas to create the painting in about 1891 in Paris, France.

Fascinating facts:

1. Rousseau said that the tiger was about to pounce on some unlucky explorers - that's why he called the painting "Surprised!"
2. If you look closely, you can see two streaks of lightning in the sky.
3. It was the first of Rousseau's jungle paintings for which he is most well known.
