WHAT WILL I STUDY?

This A Level course leads on naturally from the GCSE course, with a very up to date format that focuses on important current issues found on local, national, and global scales.

There are four units for the A Level qualification.

Component 1: Changing Landscapes and Changing Places.

- Coastal landscapes (including coastal fieldwork)
- Changing places (including urban fieldwork)

Component 2: Global Systems and Global Governance.

 Water and Carbon Cycles, Processes and Patterns of Global Migration and Global Governance of the Earth's oceans.

Component 3: Contemporary Themes in Geography.

• Tectonic Hazards, Ecosystems and Development in an African Context

Component 4: Independent Investigation.

 One written independent investigation, based on the planning, collection of both primary and secondary information, presentation, analysis, conclusion and evaluation of a geographical enquiry.

ASSESSMENT

Component 1: Changing Landscapes and Changing Places: Written examination: 1 hour 45 minutes 20.5% of qualification

Component 2: Global systems and global governance: Written examination: 2 hours 27.5% of qualification

Component 3: Contemporary Themes in Geography Written examination: 2 hours 15 minutes 32% of qualification

Component 4: Independent Investigation: Nonexam assessment: 3000 to 4000 words 20% of qualification. Teacher assessed and moderated by Eduqas

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Five GCSEs, or equivalent, grade 5 or above are required for entry into Sixth Form to study A Level.

Grade 5 GCSE or above is required in your chosen, or related subject, including English Language.

SPECIALIST FACILITIES

Fully resourced dedicated classrooms. we attempt to provide at least one overseas field trip

HOURS OF STUDY (FORTNIGHTLY)

9 hours of lesson time6 hours independent learning



CAREER OPPORTUNTIES

Geography has always been a popular subject for study at A Level and it is equally favoured as a subject for study in Higher Education.

Clearly, if students intend to follow a college course in this subject area, A Level Geography is most important. At degree level other courses that welcome the qualification include Politics, Social Studies, Economics and Business Studies, Geology and Environmental Sciences.
