## Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

### Statement of intent

- At Christow Community Primary School, we have high aspirations and ambitions for our children and we believe that all learners should be able to reach their full potential and develop a love of learning.
- Our intention is that all pupils, irrespective of their background or the challenges they face, make good progress and achieve high attainment across all subject areas.
- High quality teaching is at the heart of our approach, with a focus on areas in which disadvantage children need the most support. This is proven to have the greatest impact on closing the disadvantage attainment gap and at the same time will benefit the non-disadvantaged pupils in our school.
- In addition to this, we aim to provide pupils with access to a variety of exciting opportunities and a rich and varied curriculum.
- Given the size of our primary school and the low percentage of children who are disadvantaged can disproportionately impact data. Our approach will be responsive to individual need, rooted in robust diagnostic assessment and specific targeted support, not assumptions about the impact of disadvantage.

### Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	Assessment, observations and discussions with pupils indicate under developed oral language skills and vocabulary gaps among many disadvantaged pupils. This is particularly evident in Key Stage 1 and negatively impacts progress and attainment in Literacy.
2	Assessment, observations and discussions with pupils suggest that disadvantaged pupils have a greater difficulty with phonics than their peers. This negatively impacts their development in reading and spelling ability in KS2.
3	Pupils and their families face challenges with lack of wider family support, socio-economic difficulties and wider social emotional support.
4	Pupils have limited cultural capital
5	Our attendance data over the last year indicates that attendance among disadvantaged pupils has been between 83.6% - 94% Our assessment and observations indicate that absenteeism is negatively impacting disadvantaged pupils' progress

## Intended outcomes

## Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

### Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2023 to 2024 academic year.

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During 2023-24 we used the Pupil Premium and Service Premium Grant in the following ways: As part of our continuing school improvement plan to provide intervention strategies/extra support for pupils who are making slower progress or require supportive and individual learning and in narrowing the gap, the PPG and SPG was used in the following ways:

#### Staffing:

- Teachers working with small groups of pupils
- TA allocated per Key Stage to support the teacher with both learning and pastoral needs including addressing children's behaviour, social and emotional needs
- Additional SEN teaching assistants supporting personalised programmes (through SEND plans and provision maps for Literacy and Numeracy and specific intervention such as Speech and Language work, Social and Communication Skills)
- Support staff addressing the needs of the more vulnerable children
- Trained Teaching Assistants working with individual children and small groups in classes across the school to deliver targeted interventions.

#### Resourcing:

- Subsidising trips and educational visits at the Head Teacher's discretion
- Financial support for extended school provision
- Opportunities funded – music lessons in addition to wider opportunities
- Support with school uniform/ PE Kit provided.

#### Measurement criteria:

To narrow the gap in pupil outcomes so that pupil premium and service premium children are achieving in line with their peers.

Barriers to learning, such as behaviour, attendance, accessibility in learning are reduced or removed.
