"H" is just a "breath" in French. Try saying the number 8 in French "**huit**".

Ca va mal- I am not feeling good
Ca va très mal- I am feeling really bad

Grammar Bank

Colours are words that describe objects. We call them "**adjectives**". Watch out in French every time we meet the colours as the spelling might change to match the object the colour describes.

When you ask a question in French you can turn a sentence into a question **by raising the pitch of your voice at the end** of the question. e.g. **Ca va? Ca va.**

In French we add an 's' at the end of the nouns
to form the plural: **chats**, **chiens**, **poissons**.
Watch out for the exceptions : **oiseaux**, **chevaux**

Fact Bank

In different languages animals make different noises. In French, the noise a dog makes is "**ouaf**".

The rooster is the national symbol of France as a nation .(**le coq gaullois**)
