


Attendance/ Reading at home

After sharing that our focus this year will be on attendance and reading at home, we would like to thank all our families for enabling us to begin the term with 94.8% attendance.

Kingfisher class has had 99.2% attendance since the beginning of term and congratulations to Willow class with over 97% attendance- what a brilliant start for both classes.



Attendance at school has an impact on how well children do in school:



The pattern is similar to that for KS1. Attainment declines as absence increases.

Attendance also has a massive impact on friendships and children's mental health. Routines can really help every child. Please ensure your child is at school every day, unless they are really sick.

Attendance is everyone's responsibility.

Thanks also to all the children and families who have been reading every single night.

Ms Vickery, our reading lead, shares:

Why is reading with, or listening to your child read, so important?

A child learning to read AND learning to love reading depends upon a joint partnership between home and school.

At school, we teach children the skills they need to read and understand what they have read.

Starting with phonics in the early years, children learn to read fluently and at speed so they can then focus on developing their skills in comprehension, vocabulary and spelling.

It is vital that children have the opportunity to practise these skills as much as possible to become fluent and confident readers. They must have these skills to do well in ALL their learning across the whole curriculum.

Reading with your child or listening to them read provides the vital practice they need to embed the reading skills they have been taught in school.

Setting aside a regular time to read together at home is the best way to achieve reading success and is proven to make your child a better reader. At least 15 minutes a day has the most impact.

Most importantly, when you make time to read together you are showing your child you value reading. They learn to value and love reading too.

A child who loves and values reading is MUCH more likely to achieve well throughout their school AND adult life. Research shows that children who love reading do much better in tests and exams than their peers. A love of reading is also proven to build self-esteem, improve vocabulary, feed imaginations AND make children happier (to name just a few benefits!).

Lockdown Procedure Explained for Parents

At Wynstream, the safety of your children is our highest priority. While rare, there may be situations where we need to initiate a lockdown to keep everyone safe. Here's what that means and what you can expect:

What is a Lockdown?

A lockdown is a safety protocol used when there is a potential threat inside or near the school. It ensures that children and staff are secure in classrooms or safe areas until the situation is resolved.

What Happens During a Lockdown?

- Staff are alerted via a secure communication system.
- Children are moved to safe areas (usually their classrooms).
- Doors are locked, windows are covered, and lights may be turned off.
- Children remain quiet and calm under staff supervision.
- No one enters or leaves the building until the lockdown is lifted.

What Should Parents Do?

- Do not come to the school this could put you and others at risk.
- Avoid calling the school phone lines must remain open for emergency services.
- Wait for official communication we will update you via text, email, or our school app as soon as it is safe to do so.

How Do We Prepare Children?

We explain lockdowns in a calm and age-appropriate way, similar to fire drills. We reassure children that:

- It's just a safety practice.
- Their teachers are there to keep them safe.
- They should listen carefully and follow instructions.

Why Is This Important?

Practicing lockdowns helps children:

- Feel confident and prepared.
- Understand that safety is a priority.
- Know what to do in an emergency.
