Wassily Kandinsky (1866-1944) was a Russian painter. Many people think he was the first abstract artist. Abstract art is a combination of colours, lines, and shapes that are not meant to be realistic.

Kandinsky thought that different colours affected the mood of a painting. Kandinsky was the first painter to stop painting pictures of real things and instead paint just using colours and shapes. He believed that this let him paint honestly about his feelings. Often Kandinsky would listen to music while he painted and try to paint what he heard.

Other painters that came after him learned a lot from Kandinsky's ideas.

He is well-known for creating *abstract* paintings. Abstract art uses shapes, lines and colours but doesn't need to look *realistic*.



This painting is called 'Non-Objective' and was painted by Wassily Kandinsky in 1910

Wassily Kandinsky loved music and could play the cello and the piano. His paintings were even inspired by music.

He literally saw colours when he heard music and heard music when he painted. Kandinsky painted colours, shapes and lines to express his emotions.
