

Reading Tasks for Year One

When you have finished reading your books, you could have a go at some of these activities. You do not have to bring this work back into school but if you'd like to share it with us then put it into your reading folder ready for school on Mondays.

<u>KEY WORDS</u> Write down ten key words that are important in your reading book. They may include characters, setting or even events.	<u>SETTING DESCRIPTION</u> Draw a picture of one of the main settings in the story. Can you label your picture using adjectives or even write some descriptive sentences?	<u>STORY MAP</u> Create a story map for your reading book by drawing pictures to show the plot. Don't forget to label it with key words too.
<u>MY FAVOURITE PART</u> Tell someone about or write about your favourite part of the book and explain why you like it.	<u>FRONT COVER</u> Create a new front cover for your reading book. Include a picture, the title, author and illustrator if you can.	<u>NEW PICTURE</u> Find a part of your story that doesn't already have a picture. Draw a picture for it to show what happens.
<u>QUIZ</u> Think of or write down 3 questions about your story to ask someone at home. Make sure you know the answers before you test your family and friends.	<u>BLURB</u> Have a go at saying or writing a new blurb for the back of your book outlining the main events of your story.	<u>CHARACTER DESCRIPTION</u> Draw a picture of your favourite character in the book. Can you label your picture using adjectives or even write some descriptive sentences?

Don't forget to use your reading questions sheet to talk about your book with an adult at home too.
