What Is Chinese New Year?

Chinese New Year is also known as Lunar New Year or the Spring Festival. It is celebrated in many countries around the world.

Chinese New Year is at the start of the lunar year. The lunar year follows the phases of the Moon so the date of the festival changes each year. It is always in late January or in February.

How Is Chinese New Year Celebrated?

Chinese New Year is celebrated in lots of different ways.



- Many people spring clean their homes before the festival begins.
- Families get together to celebrate, give gifts and eat a meal of special food.
- Red is an important colour as it stands for luck, joy and happiness. It is used for decorations and some people wear red clothes.
- Money is often given to children and other family members in red envelopes.
- Lion and dragon dances often take place as part of street parades. They move and dance to loud music made by drums and cymbals.
- Fireworks and firecrackers are an important part of the celebrations each year.
- The last event of Chinese New Year is called the Lantern Festival. People might hang lanterns as decorations or carry them in a parade.

Did You Know...?

The phases of the Moon are the shapes of the Moon that we can see from Earth. A new Moon is difficult to see until it becomes a thin crescent Moon shape.

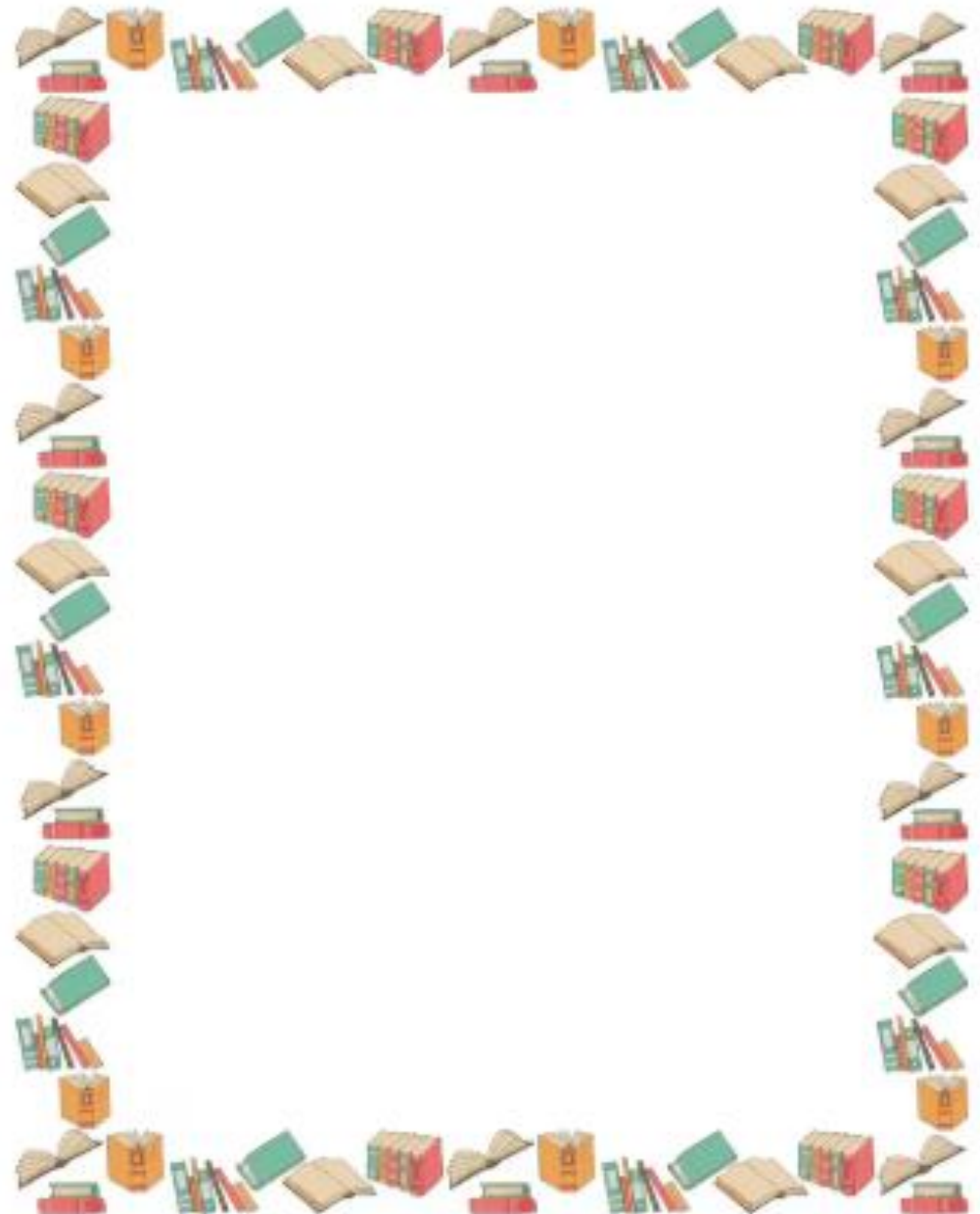
