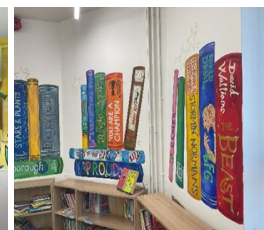
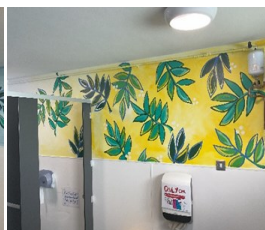
Dear Parents/ Carers,
