# Coombeshead Academy Newsletter - April 2025



Dear families,

The academic year is rushing by and we are already nearly at Easter. Our Year 7 cohort are well and truly settled in and we are now making plans and holding transition activities for our new Year 7 groups starting in September 2025. We are pleased that our new Year 7 cohort is full and we hope that is a reflection of our ongoing improvements in GCSE and A level outcomes, our high-quality teaching, supportive pastoral staff and our ever-developing inclusive approach to our students and their families.

For Year 11 and Year 13 this is a very important and busy time. Students PPE (mock exam) outcomes are the highest we have ever had and we are expecting our best results ever! I am very aware as a Year 11 Biology teacher, Headteacher and a mum of two teenagers who have just been through GCSEs and one about to sit A levels, the worry, stress and anxiety exams can cause for students and their families. My advice for parents in supporting revision is – ensure they have a plan, make revision sessions little and often and do your best to encourage them to stick to it. They need down time, lots of sleep and some small rewards/nice activities to look forward to, to break it up. The Easter holidays is a key time to get a substantial amount of revision in. Please contact your child's teacher, Mr Stevenson or Mr Balsdon if you have any key questions about revision or exams in the coming weeks.

It's incredibly important that students, families and staff feel a sense of belonging at Coombeshead and we are always working on developing the "Be nice" section of The Coombeshead Way. This term we ran a project with a small group of Year 8 boys who had been struggling with behaviour and attitude towards school and learning. We started with a core group of five students who were identified as most in need of additional support. Rather than simply imposing consequences, we invested time in truly listening to their concerns, offering consistent positive reinforcement, and emphasising how much they mattered at Coombeshead Academy. To help them grow, we introduced a weekly social skills programme and targeted literacy sessions, all guided by our talented learning coaches. This holistic approach led to significant improvements in behaviour, increased engagement in lessons, and enhanced attendance. The success of the programme sparked interest from other students, prompting the expansion of the initiative. Inspired by its success, we are planning to launch similar interventions for Year 7 students.

As ever we have had a jam-packed term with exciting enrichment and extracurricular events some of which have been highlighted in this newsletter. As I am writing this, I have just been emailed to say we have, again, won awards in the national "Show racism the red card" initiative. Izzy S and Holly J have won an award in the "All Ages Kickers Music" Category and Eloise T has won an award in the "Year 7-9 Artwork" Category. Well done to all who entered, but especially our prize-winners!

Other highlights include our student's appearance on "Spotlight" to talk about their involvement in the new tree mural on display in Newton Abbot. Our student leaders did an amazing job representing Coombeshead at a recent student South West Leadership Conference. There have been some fantastic sporting events and fixtures and our Duke of Edinburgh groups have been completing expeditions on the moors. The ski trip to Austria had a fantastic time and Year 8s had a great day at Coombeshead's own "Meet the employer" event.

# **EMOJI LANGUAGE**

In light of Netflix's recent tv show, 'Adolescence' a serious safeguarding topic has been re-highlighted that every parent, educator, and mentor needs to know about, the hidden language of emojis.

Online, young people are communicating in ways that most adults completely miss. What looks innocent could have a much darker meaning.

Listed on the page opposite are some of the codes being used as well as some guidance for parents on how to engage young people in conversations around online safety.

So what should parents do?

- Get Curious, Not Combative Ask open-ended questions: "I saw something about emojis meaning different things. Have you heard of this?" Keep the conversation light.
- Create a Judgment-Free Zone If your child feels like they'll be punished for opening up, they won't. Make it clear you're there to listen, not just lecture.
- Decode Together Ask them to explain their digital world. What do different symbols mean? Who are the influencers they follow? Don't assume, ask.
- Teach Critical Thinking Help them question online content. "Why do you think some groups push this idea? Who benefits?" Arm them with questions, not just rules.
- Monitor Without Spying Open conversations work better than secret surveillance.
   Make checking in on their online spaces a normal part of parenting, not a crisis move.
- Be Real About Manipulation Explain how toxic online groups groom young people by making them feel special, included, or like they have 'insider knowledge.'
- Build Their Offline Confidence The more they feel valued and confident in the real world, the less they'll seek validation in dangerous online spaces.

## **EMOJI LANGUAGE**

- Red Pill "I see the truth." Used in toxic male spaces to mean waking up to supposed hidden 'truths' about women and society, often linked to misogynistic ideologies.
- Blue Pill Represents those who are "blind to the truth" or still believe in mainstream views about relationships and gender dynamics.
- Dynamite Emoji An "exploding red pill," meaning someone is a radicalised incel.
- Kidney Bean A symbol linked to incel culture, sometimes mocking women.
- 100 Emoji Tied to the "80/20 rule," the belief that 80% of women are only attracted to 20% of men.
- Black Hole Used to express depression, hopelessness, or being sucked into negative online spaces.
- Tornado Represents chaos or feeling overwhelmed, sometimes used to indicate mental distress.
- Frog Emoji Associated with alt-right and extremist meme culture, often linked to Pepe the Frog, which has been co-opted by some toxic online groups.
- Eagle A symbol of extreme nationalism, sometimes used in far-right online spaces.
- Skull While often just slang for "that's funny" or "I'm dead (from laughing)," in certain groups, it can signal darker themes like nihilism or self-harm.
- ♥ ♥ ♥ ₩ Heart Colours Not just about love!
- ₩ = Love
- 💚 = Lust
- = "Are you interested?"
- = Interested but not in sex
- = "You'll be okay"

# EDUCATION SOUTH WEST STUDENT LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

On Thursday 27th February, a group of students from Coombeshead Academy attended the first ever ESW Student Leadership Conference held at KEVICC. Coombeshead students from a range of leadership roles including school council representatives, diversity ambassadors and mental health ambassadors attended the conference and were able to meet and share ideas with other student leaders from across our trust.

The Trust CEO Matthew Shanks talked to students about the importance of the role of student leaders and why it's important to celebrate what they do. Caroline Voaden (South Devon MP, Lib Dem) also addressed the conference and spoke to the students about her varied career/leadership.

Students from all schools were required to speak for five minutes about their roles and specifically, what difference/ improvements have they been able to make in their school. Hannah, Jagoda, Freddie, Dom, Lucas and Angel all represented Coombeshead brilliantly.

All ideas and responses from the conference will be edited and shared across schools and also shared with primary pupils at a planned Primary Leadership conference in the summer term.


#### YEAR 9 STUDENT AAISHA - TALK ON RAMADAN



#### **NEW COMMUNITY TREE MURAL UNVEILED**

Students from Coombeshead Academy have proudly helped complete a stunning new mural in Newton Abbot town centre that celebrates the local community's connection to nature.

'The Community Tree' has been brought to life by renowned local artist Joe Webster and is a powerful representation of the bond between the people of Newton Abbot and the natural world. Joe, known for his 'landscape-graffiti' style, explores the impact of human activity on nature, and his work has been displayed across the UK and internationally.

The mural, which stands at an impressive 16 metres high, is located in Golden Lion Square. It draws inspiration from a giant oak tree that was felled in 1922 to make way for the war memorial at the end of Queen Street. The loss of this iconic tree caused public outcry at the time, underlining the deep connection communities have with natural landmarks.

The mural project invited contributions from the local community, with residents offering stories, photos, and memories of their favourite trees. Coombeshead students were also invited to submit nature-inspired words that were incorporated into the design. A group of talented graphics students from Coombeshead Academy played a key role in the creation of the mural by designing and preparing typography work, which was used in the final artwork.

The Community Tree was part-funded by a Levelling Up Grant via Teignbridge council and many other sources. It was made possible almost entirely by 5 months of voluntary work by the artists and Rotary Newton Abbot. 'If you're enjoying the new mural and would like to see more around town please consider giving a donation via this website. All funds received will go to completing this project and creating more beautiful artwork around the town.



## **CODEX PROJECT**

Coombeshead Creative Arts Lead Shares Insights on CODEX Project in New Blog Published by NSEAD

Sam Eyre, Curriculum and Team Area Lead for the Creative Arts at Coombeshead Academy, has had a blog post featured by the National Society for Education in Art & Design (NSEAD), where he discusses the innovative CODEX project. This project, a collaboration between Sidmouth College and Sidmouth School of Art, bridges the gap between digital media and traditional printmaking. Led by Sam Eyre and printmaker Emma Molony, CODEX provides students the opportunity to explore themes of identity, personal storytelling, and emotional wellbeing through techniques like typography, photography, gel plate printing, and digital composition.

Mr Eyre explains: "CODEX allows students to push creative boundaries, explore their emotions, and express their personal narratives through art. says Sam.

"By blending traditional and digital techniques, we empower young artists to use art not only as a form of expression but as a tool for processing their emotions and connecting with their community."

The project serves as a therapeutic outlet, offering students the space to process their emotions while building technical skills and confidence.

CODEX has culminated in public exhibitions such as those at Sidmouth Wallspace and the Telephone Box Micro Museums, amplifying the voices of young people. With plans to expand across Devon, the project continues to inspire and build a sense of belonging within the local community, while reinforcing art as a powerful means of self-expression and connection.

Our student leaders declared the event a positive experience and welcomed the opportunity to reflect on the impact they have on shaping the future of education.



# **EXTENDED PROJECT QUALIFICATION**

Ten of our year 13s completed their EPQ presentations on Thursday 17th March, presenting the findings of their months long Extended Project to an audience of staff and their peers. Topics covered included "The Progression and Regression of Speech throughout the Life Stages", "How Crime is Represented in the Media", "Does Cold Water Immersion Improve Muscle Recovery?" and "How the Declining Attention Span of the Younger Generation is Affecting their Education". The presentations represented the culmination of projects that began before last summer, included hours and hours of independent research and a 5000 word report on their chosen topic. The EPQs count as half an A level and have helped develop the time management, critical thinking and independent research skills of all who have completed their projects.
