# Revision tip 2: Self quizzing

LO- To use the self quizzing technique effectively to increase memory retention



### Progression steps


- To go through the look, Cover, Write, Check technique
- To self quiz effectively on your own or in pairs
- Apply to specific revision material- Jekyll and Hyde

# Why?

- Good old fashioned quizzing is an ideal vehicle to get pupils selftesting
- Proven to be a robust revision strategy, so that you can calibrate knowledge and remembering.
- Creating a quiz or having someone test you little and often is very beneficial
- Build one into every topic/revision episode



# Step 1; Make sure that the information is embedded in your long term memory



Look – at small section (read it over and over in your head)

Cover – the section you have been reading

Write - as much as you can remember of the whole section without looking back

Check - with purple pen to ensure you have recalled accurately all information



## Step 2; Self quizzing

Using the area that you have focussed on;

- Identify key material
- Create a 5 question test that focusses on areas of weakness
- Answer these without any notes
- Using notes; purple pen and mark to ensure all of your answers are correct



#### Step 3

- You can do the same in pairs
- Work together using the look, cover, write, check technique.
- You can then either create a written test for each other
- Or
- Take it ion turns asking each other questions



For each of these quotes from Jekyll and Hyde, conduct cover/write/ check to go through the 5 quotes

- Once you have revised, test in pairs.
- If ypu are successful move on. If not go back through the same technique again

### Common Jekyll and Hyde quotes

- "lean, long, dusty, dreary and yet somehow lovable"
- Mr Utterson is a serious and solemn lawyer who is not explicitly expressive. Despite being unemotional, old, worn and bored or boring, he is still likeable.
- "He had an approved tolerance for others..."
- Mr Utterson is an understanding character who has the willingness to tolerate the existence of opinions or behaviour that one dislikes or disagrees with.
- "the last reputable acquaintance and the last good influence in the lives of down going men"
- Mr Utterson has the reputation for being a supportive and loyal friend even if those around him have changed.
- "a certain sinister block of building thrust forward"
- The back of Jekyll's house represents Hyde's persona. The rear door is truly the hidden-self, private face of Hyde.
- "blistered and distained"
- The back door is physically in poor condition similarly to Hyde's deformed appearance.

- "some place at the end of the world"
- Mr Enfield reminds us of the duality of human nature a Victorian society hidden from the face of the public where they lay a world of opium dens and prostitutes.
- "the man trampled calmly over the child's body and left her screaming"
- Hyde's first known crime. The juxtaposition of the brutality of Hyde's actions with the complacency of his reaction adds to the horror.
- "it was hellish to see"
- Mr Enfield describes to Hyde's trampling to be evil.
- "like some damned Juggernaut"
- Hyde is compared to a large immovable object suggesting his strength and brutality.
- "gave me one look, so ugly that it bought out the sweat on me like running"
- Hyde's demeanour has a long-lasting and visceral effect

- "I had taken a loathing to my gentleman at first sight...
- Mr Enfield forms a strong opinion of Hyde immediately showing the powerful affect Hyde can have on others.
- "Sawbones turned sick and white with the desire to kill him"
- The doctor forms murderous thoughts about Hyde.
- "make his name stink from one end of London to the other
- Mr Enfield promised revenge on Hyde. Highlights the importance of reputation in a Victorian society.
- "really like Satan"
- Hyde is again, compared to the devil himself.
- "a really damnable man"
- Hyde is destined for hell.

- "There is something wrong with his appearance; something displeasing, something downright detestable."
- Mr Enfield's physical description of Hyde. He cannot explain the appearance however acknowledges there is something wrong with him.
- "I never saw a man I so disliked and yet I scarce know why."
- Mr Enfield has formed a hatred for Hyde however he cannot explain himself.
- "He must be deformed, he gives a strong feeling of deformity, although I couldn't specify the point..."
- Hyde appears to be deformed and again, Mr Enfield can't explain how.
- "He's an extra-ordinary looking man..."
- Hyde's appearance is unique and out of the ordinary.
- "I am ashamed of my long tongue."
- Mr Utterson displays a distaste for sensation and gossip as this is ungentlemanly. He disapproves of the gossip with Mr Enfield.
