Statement of intent

Micklands believes that all pupils are entitled to learn in a safe and supportive environment; this means being free from all forms of bullying behaviour. This policy outlines how instances of bullying are dealt with, including the procedures to prevent occurrences of bullying.

These strategies, such as learning about tolerance and difference as part of the school's curriculum, aim to promote an inclusive, tolerant and supportive ethos at the school.

The Education and Inspections Act 2006 outlines a number of legal obligations regarding the school's response to bullying. Under section 89, schools must have measures in place to encourage good behaviour and prevent all forms of bullying amongst pupils. These measures are part of the school's Behaviour Policy, which is communicated to all pupils, school staff and parents.

All staff, parents/carers and pupils work together to prevent and reduce any instances of bullying at the school. There is a zero-tolerance policy for bullying at the school.

1. Legal framework

- 1.1. This policy has due regard to legislation, including, but not limited to, the following:
 - Education and Inspections Act 2006
 - Equality Act 2010
 - Protection from Harassment Act 1997
 - Malicious Communications Act 1988
 - Public Order Act 1986
 - Communications Act 2003
 - Human Rights Act 1998
 - Crime and Disorder Act 1998
 - Education Act 2011
- 1.2. This policy has been written in accordance with DfE advice, including, but not limited to:
 - 2017 'Preventing and tackling bullying'
 - 2021 'Sexual violence and sexual harassment between children in schools and colleges'
 - 2025 'Keeping Children Safe in Education 2025'
 - DCMS, DSIT, and UK Council for Internet Safety 'Sharing nudes and semi-nudes: advice for education settings working with children and young people'
- 1.3. This policy will be implemented in conjunction with the school's:
 - Behaviour Policy
 - Online Safety Policy
 - Child Protection and Safeguarding Policy

2. Definition

- 2.1. For the purpose of this policy, "bullying" is defined as persistent behaviour by an individual or group with the intention of verbally, physically, or emotionally harming another person or group.
- 2.2. Bullying is generally characterised by:
 - **Repetition:** Incidents are not one-offs; they are frequent and happen over a period of time.
 - **Intent:** The perpetrator(s) means to cause verbal, physical or emotional harm; it is not accidental.
 - **Targeting:** Bullying is generally targeted at a specific individual or group.
 - **Power imbalance:** Whether real or perceived, bullying is generally based on unequal power relations.
- 2.3. Vulnerable pupils are more likely to be the target of bullying due to the attitudes and behaviours some young people have towards those who are different from themselves. Vulnerable pupils may include, but are not limited to:
 - Pupils with SEND.
 - Pupils who are, or are perceived to be LGBTQ+
 - Black, Asian and minority ethnic (BAME) pupils.
 - Pupils who are adopted.

- Pupils suffering from a health problem.
- Pupils with caring responsibilities.

3. Key roles and responsibilities

- 3.1. The governing board evaluates and reviews this policy to ensure that it is non-discriminatory.
- 3.2. It is the responsibility of all staff to be alert to possible bullying of pupils and to deal with incidents as the highest priority.
- 3.3. The headteacher reviews and amends this policy, taking into account new legislation and government guidance, and using staff experience of dealing with bullying incidents in the previous year to improve procedures.
- 3.4. The headteacher keeps a bullying record of all reported incidents, including which type of bullying has occurred, to allow for proper analysis of the data collected.
- 3.5. The headteacher will analyse the data in the bullying record at termly intervals in order to identify any trends in the types of bullying occurring and implement the appropriate measures to tackle it.
- 3.6. The headteacher arranges appropriate training for staff members.
- 3.7. Teachers are alert to social dynamics in their class and are available for pupils who wish to report bullying. They also provide follow-up support after bullying incidents.
- 3.8. All members of staff ensure that they are alert to possible bullying situations, particularly exclusion from friendship groups, and that they inform the pupil's teacher of such observations.
- 3.9. All staff will avoid gender stereotyping when dealing with bullying.
- 3.10. All staff understand the composition of pupil groups, showing sensitivity to those who have been the victims of bullying.
- 3.11. All staff have a duty to report any instances of bullying once they have been approached by a pupil for support.
- 3.12. Parents are advised to inform their child's teacher if they are concerned that their child may be being bullied or be involved in bullying.
- 3.13. Pupils are advised to inform a member of staff if they witness bullying, or are a victim of bullying.
- 3.14. Pupils are taught not to make counter-threats if they are victims of bullying.
- 3.15. Pupils are taught to walk away from any dangerous situations and avoid involving other pupils in incidents.
- 3.16. Pupils are advised to retain all evidence of cyber bullying.

- 3.17. Pupils are encouraged to safely challenge discriminatory or bullying behaviour when they feel confident to do so, or report it to an adult immediately.

4. Types of bullying

- 4.1. Many different kinds of behaviour can be considered bullying and can be related to almost anything. Teasing another pupil because of their appearance, religion, ethnicity, gender, sexual-orientation, home life, culture, disability, or special educational needs are some of the types of bullying that can occur.
- 4.2. Bullying is acted out through the following mediums:
- Verbally
 - Physically
 - Emotionally
 - Online (Cyber)
- 4.3. **Racist bullying:** Bullying another person based on their ethnic background, religion or skin colour. Racist bullying is a criminal offence under the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 and Public Order Act 1986.
- 4.4. **Homophobic/biphobic bullying:** Bullying another person because of their actual or perceived sexual orientation.
- 4.5. **Transphobic bullying:** Bullying based on another person's gender 'variance' or for not conforming to dominant gender roles.
- 4.6. **Sexist bullying:** Bullying based on sexist attitudes expressed in a way to demean, intimidate or harm another person because of their sex or gender. Sexist bullying may sometimes be characterised by inappropriate sexual behaviours.
- 4.7. **Sexual bullying:** Bullying behaviour that has a physical, psychological, verbal or non-verbal sexual dimension/dynamic that subordinates, humiliates or intimidates another person. This is commonly underpinned by sexist attitudes or gender stereotypes.
- 4.8. **Ableist bullying:** Bullying behaviour that focusses on another person's disability or support needs; this can include mocking the individual's disability or their needs, using derogatory words or slurs in relation to an individual's disability, or deliberately excluding an individual because of their disability.
- 4.9. **Prejudicial bullying:** Bullying based on prejudices directed towards specific characteristics or experiences, e.g. religion or mental health issues.
- 4.10. **Relational bullying:** Bullying that primarily constitutes of excluding, isolating and ostracising someone – usually through verbal and emotional bullying.

- 4.11. **Socioeconomic bullying:** Bullying based on prejudices against the perceived social status of the victim, including, but not limited to, their economic status, their parents' occupations, their health or nutrition level, or the perceived "quality" of their clothing or belongings.

5. Statutory implications

- 5.1. The school understands that, under the Equality Act 2010, it has a responsibility to: eliminate unlawful discrimination, harassment, victimisation and any other conduct prohibited by the act; advance equality of opportunity between people who share a protected characteristic and people who do not share it; and foster good relations between people who share a protected characteristic and people who do not share it.
- 5.2. The school understands that, under the Human Rights Act (HRA) 1998, it could have charges brought against it if it allows the rights of children and young people at the school to be breached by failing to take bullying seriously.
- 5.3. The NAHT has guidelines that recommend headteachers must 'satisfy themselves' that their school's Anti-Bullying Policy complies with the HRA; the headteacher understands that they cannot do this without fully involving their teaching staff.
- 5.4. Although bullying itself is not a criminal offence, some types of harassment, threatening behaviour and/or communications may be considered criminal offences:
- Under the Malicious Communications Act 1988, it is an offence for a person to electronically communicate with another person with the intent to cause distress or anxiety, or in a way which conveys a message which is indecent or grossly offensive, a threat, or contains information which is false and known or believed to be false by the sender.
 - The Protection from Harassment Act 1997 makes it an offence to knowingly pursue any course of conduct amounting to harassment.
 - Section 127 of the Communications Act 2003 makes it an offence to send, by means of a public electronic communications network, a message, or other matter, that is grossly offensive or of an indecent, obscene or menacing character. It is unlawful to disseminate defamatory information through any media, including internet sites.
 - Other forms of bullying which are illegal and should be reported to the police include: violence or assault, theft, repeated harassment or intimidation and hate crimes.

6. Prevention

- 6.1. All reported or witnessed instances of bullying in the school are investigated by a member of staff.
- 6.2. Staff encourage pupil cooperation and the development of interpersonal skills through the use of group work and pair work.

- 6.3. All types of bullying are discussed as part of the curriculum, and diversity, difference and respect for others is promoted and celebrated through various lessons.
- 6.4. Seating arrangements in class will be changed and organised in a way that prevents instances of bullying.
- 6.5. Potential victims of bullying are drawn into working groups with children who do not abuse or take advantage of them.
- 6.6. Opportunities to extend friendship groups and interactive skills are provided through participation in special events, for example, drama productions, sporting activities and other groups.
- 6.7. All members of the school community are made aware of the school's Anti-bullying Policy.
- 6.8. All staff members receive training on identifying and dealing with the different types of bullying.
- 6.9. A safe place, supervised by a teacher, is available for pupils to go to at lunch if they are involved in conflict with their peers, or wish to avoid a bully.
- 6.10. The teacher supervising the area will speak to pupils to find out the cause of any problems and, ultimately, stop any form of bullying taking place.
- 6.11. The school promotes a culture of mutual respect through assemblies, curriculum, pupil leadership opportunities and role modelling by staff. Our PSHE curriculum actively builds empathy and inclusion.

7. Signs of bullying

- 7.1. Staff will be alert to the following signs that may indicate a pupil is a victim of bullying:
 - Being frightened to travel to or from school
 - Asking to be driven to school
 - Unwillingness to attend school
 - Truancy
 - Becoming anxious or lacking confidence
 - Saying that they feel ill in the morning
 - Decreased involvement in school work
 - Returning home with torn clothes or damaged possessions
 - Missing possessions
 - Asking for money or stealing
 - Cuts or bruises
 - Lack of appetite
 - Unwillingness to use the internet or mobile devices
 - Becoming agitated when collecting their phone at the end of the day
 - Lack of eye contact
 - Becoming short tempered
 - Change in behaviour and attitude at home

- 7.2. Although the signs outlined above may not be due to bullying, they may be due to deeper social, emotional or mental health issues, so are still worth investigating.
- 7.3. Pupils who display a significant number of these signs are approached by a member of staff, in order to determine the underlying issues, whether they are due to bullying or other issues.

8. Staff principles

- 8.1. Prevention is at the forefront of the school's Anti-bullying Policy.
- 8.2. Staff treat reports of bullying very seriously.
- 8.3. Staff do not ignore signs of suspected bullying.
- 8.4. Unpleasantness from one pupil towards another is always challenged and never ignored.
- 8.5. Staff take action immediately when they become aware of a bullying incident; this applies to all staff, not solely teaching staff.
- 8.6. Staff always respect pupils' privacy, and information about specific instances of bullying are not discussed with others, unless it is in a setting that the victim has given consent to. If the member of staff believes the pupil is in serious danger, e.g. of being hurt, they will inform the DSL immediately.
- 8.7. Follow-up support is given to both the victim and bully in the months following any incidents, to ensure all bullying has stopped.

9. Preventing child-on-child sexual abuse

- 9.1. The school takes a zero-tolerance approach to all forms of child-on-child sexual abuse, including sexual harassment and sexual violence.
- 9.2. Sexual harassment refers to unwanted conduct of a sexual nature that occurs online or offline. Sexual harassment violates a child's dignity and makes them feel intimidated, degraded or humiliated, and can create a hostile, sexualised or offensive environment. If left unchallenged, sexual harassment can create an atmosphere that normalises inappropriate behaviour and may lead to sexual violence.
- 9.3. Sexual violence refers to the three following offences:
 - **Rape:** A person (A) commits an offence of rape if he intentionally penetrates the vagina, anus or mouth of another person (B) with his penis, B does not consent to the penetration and A does not reasonably believe that B consents.
 - **Assault by Penetration:** A person (A) commits an offence if s/he intentionally penetrates the vagina or anus of another person (B) with a part of her/his body or anything else, the penetration is sexual, B does not consent to the penetration and A does not reasonably believe that B consents.
 - **Sexual Assault:** A person (A) commits an offence of sexual assault if s/he intentionally touches another person (B), the touching is sexual, B does not consent to the touching and A does not reasonably believe that B consents.

- 9.4. The school's child-on-child abuse policy outlines our stance on addressing child-on-child sexual abuse, and the procedures in place should any instances of sexual harassment or sexual violence be uncovered.
- 9.5. In order to prevent child-on-child abuse and address the wider societal factors that can influence behaviour, the school will educate pupils at an appropriate level about abuse, its forms and the importance of discussing any concerns and respecting others through the curriculum, assemblies and PSHE lessons.
- 9.6. The school will also ensure that pupils are taught about safeguarding, including online safety, as part of a broad and balanced curriculum in PSHE lessons. Such content will be age and stage of development specific, and tackle issues such as the following:
- Healthy relationships
 - Respectful behaviour
 - Gender roles, stereotyping and equality
 - Body confidence and self-esteem
 - Prejudiced behaviour
- 9.7. All staff will be aware that pupils of any age and sex are capable of abusing their peers and will never tolerate abuse as "banter" or "part of growing up".
- 9.8. All staff will be aware that child-on-child abuse can be manifested in many different ways, including sexting and gender issues, such as being sexually touched or assaulted, and being subjected to hazing/initiation type of violence which aims to cause physical, emotional or psychological harm.
- 9.9. All staff will be made aware of the heightened vulnerability of pupils with SEND, who are three times more likely to be abused than their peers. Staff will not assume that possible indicators of abuse relate to the pupil's SEND and will always explore indicators further.
- 9.10. LGBTQ+ children can be targeted by their peers. In some cases, children who are perceived to be LGBTQ+, whether they are or not, can be just as vulnerable to abuse as LGBTQ+ children. The school's response to boy-on-boy and girl-on-girl sexual violence and sexual harassment will be equally as robust as it is for incidents between children of the opposite sex.
- 9.11. Pupils will be made aware of how to raise concerns or make a report and how any reports will be handled. This includes the process for reporting concerns about friends or peers.
- 9.12. If a child has been harmed, is in immediate danger or is at risk of harm, a referral will be made to children's social care services.

Managing disclosures

- 9.13. Victims will always be taken seriously, reassured, supported and kept safe. Victims will never be made to feel like they are causing a problem or made to feel ashamed.
- 9.14. Micklands understands that children may not be ready to make a disclosure.
- 9.15. If a friend of a victim makes a report or a member of staff overhears a conversation, staff will take action – they will never assume that someone else will deal with it. The basic principles

remain the same as when a victim reports an incident; however, staff will consider why the victim has not chosen to make a report themselves and the discussion will be handled sensitively and with the help of CSCS where necessary. If staff are in any doubt, they will speak to the DSL.

- 9.16. The DSL will be informed of any allegations of abuse against pupils with SEND. They will record the incident in writing and, working with the SENDCO, decide what course of action is necessary, with the best interests of the pupil in mind at all times.

Confidentiality

- 9.17. The school will only engage staff and agencies required to support the victim and/or be involved in any investigation. If a victim asks the school not to tell anyone about the disclosure, the school cannot make this promise. Even without the victim's consent, the information may still be lawfully shared if it is in the public interest and protects children from harm.
- 9.18. The DSL will consider the following when making confidentiality decisions:
- Parents will be informed unless it will place the victim at greater risk.
 - If a child is at risk of harm, is in immediate danger or has been harmed, a referral will be made to children's social care services.
 - Rape, assault by penetration and sexual assaults are crimes – reports containing any such crimes will be passed to the police.
- 9.19. More information regarding the school's stance on preventing child-on-child sexual abuse is available in our child-on-child abuse policy.

10. Cyber bullying

- 10.1. The school has in place an E-Safety Policy, which outlines the school's zero tolerance approach to cyber bullying.
- 10.2. Micklands views cyber bullying in the same light as any other form of bullying and will follow the sanctions set out in [section 12](#) of this policy if they become aware of any incidents.
- 10.3. The school will support pupils who have been victims of cyber bullying by holding formal and informal discussions with the pupil about their feelings and whether the bullying has stopped, in accordance with [section 13](#) and [section 14](#) of this policy.
- 10.4. In accordance with the Education Act 2011, the school has the right to examine and delete files from pupils' personal devices, e.g. mobiles phones, where there is good reason to do so. This power applies to all schools and there is no need to have parental consent to search through a young person's mobile phone. In these cases, the school's Searching and Confiscation Policy will be followed.
- 10.5. If an electronic device is seized by a member of staff, and there is reasonable ground to suspect that it contains evidence in relation to an offence, the device must be given to the police as soon as it is reasonably practicable.

- 10.6. If a staff member finds material that they do not suspect contains evidence in relation to an offence, the headteacher will decide whether it is appropriate to delete or retain the material as evidence of a breach of the relevant policies.
- 10.7. Staff and pupils will be instructed not to respond or retaliate to cyberbullying incidents. Evidence of the incident should be recorded, e.g. taking screenshots.
- 10.8. Staff will report incidents to their line manager or the headteacher for the incident to be investigated and support to be provided. Pupils will report incidents to a trusted member of staff.
- 10.9. Where offensive content is posted online targeting a staff member or pupil, the person targeted will be encouraged to use the reporting mechanism on the website or social media platform to request its removal. Where the person who has posted it is known to the school, the headteacher will request they remove it directly.
- 10.10. The school will support pupils who have been victims of cyberbullying by holding formal and informal discussions with the pupil about their feelings and whether the bullying has stopped, in accordance with this policy.
- 10.11. The school recognises that harmful online trends and viral challenges, including those promoted on social media, may lead to bullying, unsafe behaviour or peer pressure. These are monitored through the school's online safety provision and addressed through curriculum and safeguarding responses.
- 10.12. The school's filtering and monitoring systems help identify potential cyberbullying behaviour and safeguard children from accessing or being targeted by harmful content.

11. Procedures

- 11.1. Minor incidents are reported to the victim's teacher, who investigates the incident, sets appropriate sanctions for the perpetrator and informs the headteacher of the incident and outcome.
- 11.2. When investigating a bullying incident, the following procedures are adopted:
 - The victim, alleged bully and witnesses are all interviewed separately
 - Members of staff ensure that there is no possibility of contact between the pupils being interviewed, including electronic communication
 - If a pupil is injured, members of staff take the pupil immediately to first aid for a medical opinion on the extent of their injuries
 - A room is used that allows for privacy during interviews
 - A witness is used for serious incidents
 - If appropriate, the alleged bully, the victim and witnesses, are asked to write down details of the incident; this may need prompting with questions from the member of staff to obtain the full picture
 - Premature assumptions are not made, as it is important not to be judgemental at this stage
 - Members of staff listen carefully to all accounts, being non-confrontational and not attaching blame until the investigation is complete

- All concerned pupils are informed that they must not discuss the interview with other pupils
- 11.3. Due to the potential for sexist, transphobic and sexual bullying to be characterised by inappropriate sexual behaviour, staff members involved in dealing with the incident are required to consider whether there is a need for safeguarding processes to be implemented.

12. Sanctions

- 12.1. If the headteacher is satisfied that bullying did take place, the pupil will be helped to understand the consequences of their actions and warned that there must be no further incidents.
- 12.2. The headteacher informs the pupil of the type of sanction to be used in this instance and future sanctions if the bullying continues.
- 12.3. If possible, the headteacher will attempt reconciliation and will obtain a genuine apology from the bully. This will either be in writing to the victim (and/or witnesses if appropriate), or face-to-face, but only with the victim's full consent. Discretion is used here; victims will never feel pressured into a face-to-face meeting with the bully.
- 12.4. The perpetrator is made to realise, by speaking once per week with their teacher, that some pupils do not appreciate the distress they are causing, and that they should change their behaviour.
- 12.5. Parents are informed of bullying incidents and what action is being taken.
- 12.6. The headteacher and class teacher/s informally monitor the pupils involved over the next half-term.

13. Support

- 13.1. If the pupil is taking part in ELSA or any other therapeutic support, the adult informally checks whether the bullying has stopped.
- 13.2. The teacher holds an informal discussion, to check whether the bullying has stopped, on a weekly basis for a month after the initial complaint of bullying.
- 13.3. The teacher holds a formal meeting, on a monthly basis, to check whether the bullying has stopped – these formal meetings will continue to take place once a month until the headteacher and victim are confident the bullying has stopped.
- 13.4. If necessary, group dynamics are broken up by members of staff by assigning places in classes.
- 13.5. The victim is encouraged to tell a trusted adult in school if bullying is repeated.

- 13.6. The victim is encouraged to broaden their friendship groups by joining a lunchtime or after-school club or activity.

14. Follow up support

- 14.1. The progress of both the bully and the victim are monitored by their teacher/s. One-on-one sessions to discuss how they are progressing may be appropriate.
- 14.2. If appropriate, follow-up correspondence is arranged with parents one month after the incident.
- 14.3. Pupils who have been bullied are supported in the following ways:
- Being listened to
 - Having an immediate opportunity to meet with their teacher or a member of staff of their choice
 - Being reassured
 - Being offered continued support
 - Being offered emotional support (e.g. ELSA), where appropriate.
- 14.4. Pupils who have bullied others are supported in the following ways:
- Receiving a consequence for their actions
 - Being able to discuss what happened
 - Being helped to reflect on why they became involved
 - Being helped to understand what they did wrong and why they need to change their behaviour
 - Appropriate assistance from parents.
- 14.5. Pupils who have been bullied will be assessed on a case-by-case basis and the DSL will, if necessary, refer the victim of bullying to CAMHS.
- 14.6. In cases where the effects of bullying are so severe that the pupil cannot successfully reintegrate back into the school, the headteacher will look to transfer the pupil to another mainstream school.
- 14.7. Where a child has developed such complex needs that alternative provision is required, then the pupil who has been the victim of bullying, their parents, the headteacher/DSL will meet to discuss the use of alternative provision.

15. Bullying outside of school

- 15.1. Teachers have the power to discipline pupils for misbehaving outside of the school premises. This can relate to any bullying incidents occurring anywhere off the school premises, such as on school or public transport, outside the local shops, or in a town or village centre.
- 15.2. Where bullying outside school is reported to school staff, it is investigated and acted on. In all cases of misbehaviour or bullying, members of staff can only discipline the pupil on school premises, or elsewhere when the pupil is under the lawful control of the member of staff.

- 15.3. The headteacher has a specific statutory power to discipline pupils for poor behaviour outside of the school premises. Section 89(5) of the Education and Inspections Act 2006 gives the headteacher the power to regulate pupils' conduct when they are not on school premises, and therefore, not under the lawful charge of a school staff member.
- 15.4. The headteacher is responsible for determining whether it is appropriate to notify the police of the action taken against a pupil.
- 15.5. If the misbehaviour could be of a criminal nature, or poses a serious threat to a member of the public, the police are always informed.

16. Monitoring and review

- 16.1. This policy is reviewed every three years by the headteacher. The date of the next review is September 2028.
