Dear Parents and Carers

Many of our children use social media to connect with friends, share interests, and explore their identities. While this can be positive, we are increasingly seeing the negative impact of online interactions — particularly those that happen outside of school but spill over into friendships and behaviour during the school day.

It is important to recognise that schools and families both have a role to play. Social media use primarily takes place at home – we have tight restrictions in place at school to stop access – and we rely on parents and carers to help guide their children in using it safely and responsibly. However, when these issues affect relationships or wellbeing in school, we will always support children in repairing and learning from those situations. Working together is the only way we can help children develop healthy digital habits, in a world which at times is extremely difficult for children to navigate.

We ask families to regularly check what social media platforms their children are using and whether these are **age-appropriate**. The minimum age guideline for **Instagram**, **TikTok**, **Snapchat**, **Facebook**, **and YouTube** is **13 years old**, and for **WhatsApp** it is also **13** (previously 16). These limits exist to protect children's safety, wellbeing, and emotional development online.

At school, we continue to teach children how to use the internet safely, to think critically about what they see online, and to treat others with respect in all forms of communication. We also help them understand that what they post or say online has real-life consequences.

We would encourage you to keep talking openly with your child about their social media use — what they enjoy, what worries them, and what to do if something goes wrong. The more we talk, the safer and more confident our children will be online.

Thank you, as always, for your support in helping our children grow into responsible, kind, and respectful digital citizens.

CLASS 'SNAPPY' NEWS

"Remembering and thinking of others"

Nursery

This week, Nursery had lots of fun exploring the story of the Little red hen. The children enjoyed listening to the tale and joining in with the repeated phrases "Not I". We acted out the story using our own animal's masks working together to retell the story, such great performers.

Using clay, we moulded our very own Little red hen, adding wings and a beak. They were very proud of their creations. We've been talking about the importance of helping others and working together, just like The little red hen wanted her friends to do.



Class 1

Class 1 are doing fabulously in their daily maths sessions. This week our maths focus has been careful counting of 5 items. There are all sorts of skills to master here; organising the items, saying the number names in the correct order, 1 to 1 correspondence of number name

to item and understanding that the last number spoken is the total of the set. The class has a funny puppet called Miss Count who needs lots of help from Class 1 to remember to do all these things.



Class 2

This week Class 2 have loved travelling to Letter Village. When we go to Letter Village, we learn how to be accurate handwriters.

In Maths we have counted from 1 to 100! We have been using number lines to explore place value and dienes to create numbers in base ten.

In science we explored the season of autumn and compared it to summer. We took a photograph with a tree and are excitedly waiting to see how it changes through the season.

Class 3

It's been another busy and exciting week of learning in class 3! We have been exploring non-fiction texts and developing our reading comprehension skills. The children have been learning how to scan and skim for key information, which helps them retrieve facts quickly and effectively.

In maths, we have been focusing on addition and subtraction, practising different strategies to solve problems accurately and with confidence. Class 4

We have moved onto fractions in maths - looking at equivalence and simplifying.

Competition - Crocus Bulb Creation Competition:

Crocus planting fun - for the whole school. If you would like to enter, we ask that you plant your bulbs as a family this Autumn and bring to school Mid January for judging. Prizes for:

How to grow a crocus:

Crocus bulbs should be planted from September to December. to allow roots to develop before winter. Plant them about 3-4 inches (8-10 cm) deep in well-drained soil, with the pointed side facing up. Planting time can extend as late as December, as long as the ground isn't frozen.



We have purchased a new bird feeding station, to encourage different birds to our grounds ahead of Bird Watching Week 2026. If you have any feeders you would like to donate to the school, please do drop them into the school office.

HEAD LICE

Please check your child's hair!



Head lice have been reported in school. It is important to regularly check your child's hair for head lice.

The best technique is to use a head lice comb when the hair is wet, leaving in conditioner and combing the hair in sections. When the hair is wet, head lice cannot move so they are easier to comb out. Please note that they do not jump or fly, you can only catch head lice from head to head contact. If you find head lice, please treat appropriately: the wet combing technique eradicates the lice and eggs. This should be done every 3 to 4 days over a 2-week period to break the life cycle.



What fraction of the square is shaded?


How many different ways could you shade $\frac{1}{2}$?

Everything changes when a dangerous army known as the Gorm attacks his home, and Podkin must escape with his brother and sister. Their journey takes them through forests, caves and ancient warrens as they try to keep a powerful magical object out of the wrong hands.

The story is full of excitement and tension, but it also has plenty of heart. Podkin begins as an unlikely hero, and watching him find his courage makes the book especially appealing to readers in Key Stage 2. The world is richly imagined, the characters feel real, and each chapter keeps you turning the pages to find out what happens next.

Simple ways to enjoy the festive season without overspending

Christmas can be a great time to relax and spend time with family, but it often comes with extra costs and pressure to spend more than we'd like. With household budgets already stretched, a bit of planning can make a real difference.

1. Set a Realistic Budget

Work out what you can comfortably afford to spend and stick to it. It's easy for small extras to add up, so keep a list of what you need — and what you don't. If you can, set aside a small amount each week to spread the cost.

2. Keep Gifts Simple

Children often remember the fun and attention more than what's under the tree. Lowcost or homemade <u>gifts</u>, <u>or</u> pooling together for a "Secret Santa" within the family, can keep things fair and affordable for everyone.

3. Plan Food Carefully

Christmas dinner doesn't need to be over the top. Planning meals in advance helps avoid waste, and sharing the cooking with friends or relatives can save both time and money.

4. Make the Most of What's Local

There are plenty of free or low-cost events in Teignbridge over the festive period from school fairs to community activities. These can be a great way to get into the Christmas spirit without spending much.

5. Don't Feel Pressured

It's fine to say no to things that stretch your budget. A walk to see the lights, a film night at home, or a board game with family can make just as good memories as anything that costs money.

Should I keep my

child off school?



Until...

Chickenpox	at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over
Diarrhoea and Vomiting	48 hours after their last episode
Cold and Flu-like illness (including COVID-19)	they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to attend. Follow the national guidance if they've tested positive for COVID-19
Impetigo	their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hours after they started antibiotics
Measles	4 days after the rash first appeared
Mumps	5 days after the swelling started
Scabies	they've had their first treatment
Scarlet Fever	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics
Whooping Cough	48 hours after they started taking antibiotics


