#### Michael Rosen Day

November 12th was the first ever Michael Rosen Day. We celebrated this across the whole school by watching his live lesson, followed by working on some of his poems.



EYFS celebrated with enthusiasm. His live lesson sparked much excitement as he shared his insights into 'We're Going on a Bear Hunt'. They then performed this story, acting out each part of the journey.

Years 1 and 2read the story I'm Hungry. They also listened to Michael Rosen perform it and practiced fluency and expression through some echo reading. They then drew or wrote a list of all the things the squirrel wanted to eat! It was an unusual list!

Years 3 and 4 read the poem Breakfast Time. It is a repetitive poem that end with- It's breakfast time. They brainstormed ideas as to what happened in their houses and also about lunchtime. The children then wrote a final verse.

Years 5 and 6 wrote their own poems based on his migration poem, 'Everyone comes from somewhere'.

Michael Rosen's key message was "Read, read, read, read, read and read!" He told us that it opens our minds and gives us ideas for our own writing.


# Key Stage Two Book recommendations

2GH recommend Fergus the Furball - Emily Snape.


We thought it was funny, adventurous and it kept us wanting to read more! The characters were very humorous, leaving us all laughing out loud at many points of the book.

The Twits by Roald Dahl


I thought it was a very good story.

# Governor book review for parents/carers...



#### Governor Book Review Tracey York

If you love adventure, character redemption and animals, this is a fantastic novel to escape into the pages of.

The story, based on a true event, tracks the journey of those that transported two giraffes across South America to San Diego Zoo in South California in 1938. The giraffes themselves had already survived the boat journey through a hurricane out in the Atlantic Sea before they then started a twelve-day journey travelling the many landscapes of their Southern American route.



Obviously, the giraffes will steal your hearts. They are the stars of the story with their majestic beauty and ethereal natures. The protagonist, Woodrow Nickel, transports the giraffes 'by accident' alongside the 'rough-round-the-edges' zookeeper Riley Jones, chased by a wannabe photographic journalist who feels she is landing the scoop of the century by following the giraffes' journey.

All good stories keep you hanging on and reading. I read this in four days because it was relentlessly adventurous and kept me sitting on the edge of my seat.

# PARENT READING TIPS

Point at objects and name them (dog, cat, house)

Talk back and forth with your baby

Play games with them while you are reading

AGE 0-1

Smile and answer your child's questions

Encourage them to point at objects and name them

Have them help turn the pages

AGE 1-2

Ask them questions about the book

Talk about the pictures and what the words mean

Let them pick out the book they want to read

Reward them and set goals for reading

AGE 2-3

Point out letters and numbers

Look at pictures and make up stories about them

Talk about the different characters

Ask them their take on the story

AGE 3-4

Have your child tell the story

Encourage writing and drawing

Ask them the meaning of the story

Have a conversation about what the words mean

AGE 4-5
