UKS2 PSHE and Citizenship Living in the Wider World - Diverse Britain Guide for Parents and Carers

This term, your child's PSHE and Citizenship topic is 'Diverse Britain'.

This unit is inspired by the idea that Britain represents a wide range of faiths and ethnicities and that the structures within it are there to support all. It aims to enable the children to identify how they can make a positive contribution to the community. In this unit, children learn about the law and the consequences of not respecting it. They will also learn about the workings of local and national government and the role of charities and voluntary groups in British society.

We will be exploring these questions:

- **Lesson 1:** What kind of people live in our nation? How can we show respect for people whose faith or ethnicity is different to ours?
- **Lesson 2:** What is a community and who makes it what it is? How can we contribute to our community?
- **Lesson 3:** How does the law help us? What could happen if laws are broken?
- Lesson 4: What is 'local government' and what does it do? How does local government work?
- **Lesson 5:** What is 'national government' and what does it do? How does national government work?
- **Lesson 6:** What are charities and voluntary groups? What do they do?

Your child will be taking part in a range of activities, including the following:

Designing a poster, writing pledges for how they can contribute to their community, writing a 'Beginner's Guide to the Law', creating a local and national government quiz, model-making, ICT research tasks and discussion time.

PSHE stands for Personal, Social, Health and Economic education. It is an important part of the school curriculum that aims to teach children the knowledge and skills that they need to stay safe, happy and healthy, while preparing them for their life ahead.
