Online Safety Policy

1. Policy Aims

- This online safety policy has been written by Durham Trinity School and Sports College involving staff, learners (where appropriate) and parents/carers, building on the Kent County Council/The Education People/Durham County Council online safety policy template, with specialist advice and input as required.
- It takes into account the DfE statutory guidance '[Keeping Children Safe in Education](#)' 2025, '[Early Years and Foundation Stage](#) 2021, '[Working Together to Safeguard Children](#)' 2023 and the '[Durham Safeguarding Children Partnership](#)' procedures.
- The purpose of Durham Trinity School and Sports College's online safety policy is to:
 - Safeguard and protect all members of Durham Trinity School and Sports College's community online.
 - Identify approaches to educate and raise awareness of online safety throughout the community.
 - Enable all staff to work safely and responsibly, to role model positive behaviour online and to manage professional standards and practice when using technology.
 - Identify clear procedures to use when responding to online safety concerns.
- Durham Trinity School and Sports College identifies that the issues classified within online safety are considerable, but can be broadly categorised into four areas of risk:
 - **Content:** being exposed to illegal, inappropriate, or harmful content, for example: pornography, racism, misogyny, self-harm, suicide, anti-Semitism, radicalisation, extremism, misinformation, disinformation (including fake news) and conspiracy theories (KCSIE 2025, Paragraph 135).
 - **Contact:** being subjected to harmful online interaction with other users
 - **Conduct:** personal online behaviour that increases the likelihood of, or causes, harm.
 - **Commerce:** risks such as online gambling, inappropriate advertising, phishing and or financial scams. We will report any concerns to the [Anti-Phishing Working Group](#)

2. Policy Scope

- Durham Trinity School and Sports College believes that online safety is an essential part of safeguarding and acknowledges its duty to ensure that all learners and staff are protected from potential harm online.
- Durham Trinity School and Sports College identifies that the internet and associated devices, such as computers, tablets, mobile phones and games consoles, are an important part of everyday life.
- Durham Trinity School and Sports College believes that learners should be empowered to build resilience and to develop strategies to manage and respond to risk online.

- This policy applies to all staff including the governing body, the senior leadership team, teaching staff, caretaking and cleaning staff, administration staff, external contractors, visitors, volunteers and other individuals who work for, or provide services on behalf of Durham Trinity School and Sports College (collectively referred to as “staff” in this policy) as well as learners, parents and carers.
- This policy applies to all access to the internet and use of technology, including personal devices, or where learners, staff or other individuals have been provided with setting issued devices for use off-site, such as a work laptops, tablets or mobile phones.

Links with other policies and practices

This policy links with several other policies, practices and action plans including:

- Acceptable Use Policies (AUP) and the Code of Conduct

- Data Protection Policy
- Low Level Concerns Policy
- Photographic Consent Policy
- DfE Guidance on Searching, Screening and Confiscation

3. Monitoring and Review

- Technology in this area evolves and changes rapidly. Durham Trinity School and Sports College will review this policy at least annually.
- The policy will also be revised following any national or local policy requirements, any child protection concerns or any changes to the technical infrastructure
- We will regularly monitor internet use and evaluate online safety mechanisms to ensure that this policy is consistently applied.
- To ensure they have oversight of online safety, the Senior Leadership Team will be informed of online safety concerns, as appropriate.
- The named governor for safeguarding (Mrs Sarah Glover) will report on a regular basis to the governing body, following a meeting with the Online Safety Lead, on online safety practice and incidents, including filtering and monitoring processes.
- Any issues identified via monitoring will be incorporated into our action planning.

4. Roles and Responsibilities

- The Online Safety Lead, Mrs Fiona Day (Assistant Head teacher), has lead responsibility for Online Safety with the support of the Designated Safeguarding Lead, Mr Jack Peacock (Assistant Head teacher).
- Durham Trinity School and Sports College recognises that all members of the community have important roles and responsibilities to play with regards to online safety.
- Governors will ensure online safety is a running and interrelated theme whilst devising and implementing our whole-school approach to safeguarding. The designated safeguarding governor will monitor this.

a. The school senior leadership team will:

- Ensure that online safety is viewed as a safeguarding issue and that practice is in line with national and local recommendations and requirements.
- Ensure there are appropriate and up-to-date policies regarding online safety; including a staff code of conduct policy and an acceptable use policy, which covers acceptable use of technology.
- Ensure that suitable and appropriate filtering and monitoring systems are in place and work with technical staff to monitor the safety and security of our systems and networks. For further detail see [DfE guidance on meeting digital and technology standards in schools and colleges](#).
- Ensure that online safety is embedded within a progressive curriculum, which enables all learners to develop an age-appropriate understanding of online safety.
- Support the Designated Safeguarding Lead, Online Safety Lead and any Deputy Safeguarding Leads by ensuring they have sufficient time and resources to fulfil their online safety responsibilities.
- Ensure there are robust reporting channels for the community to access regarding online safety concerns, including internal, local and national support.
- Ensure that appropriate risk assessments are undertaken regarding the safe use of technology.
- Audit and evaluate online safety practice to identify strengths and areas for improvement.
- Ensure that all appropriate action to meet the Cyber security standards for schools and colleges [Meeting digital and technology standards in schools and colleges - Cyber security standards for schools and colleges - Guidance - GOV.UK](#) is taken to improve our resilience against cyber-attacks.

b. The Designated Online Safety Lead (in association with the Designated Safeguarding Lead) will:

- Act as a named point of contact on all online safeguarding issues and liaise with other members of staff or other agencies, as appropriate.
- Work alongside any Deputy Safeguarding Leads to ensure online safety is recognised as part of the settings safeguarding responsibilities and that a coordinated approach is implemented.
- Ensure all members of staff receive regular, up-to-date and appropriate online safety training.

- Access regular and appropriate training and support to ensure they understand the unique risks associated with online safety and have the relevant knowledge and up to date required to keep learners safe online.
- Access regular and appropriate training and support to ensure they recognise the additional risks that learners with SEN and disabilities (SEND) face online.
- Keep up-to-date with current research, legislation and trends regarding online safety and communicate this with the community, as appropriate.
- Work with staff to coordinate participation in local and national events to promote positive online behaviour, such as Safer Internet Day.
- Ensure that online safety is promoted to parents, carers and the wider community, through a variety of channels and approaches.
- Maintain records of online safety concerns, as well as actions taken, as part of the settings safeguarding recording mechanisms.
- Monitor online safety incidents to identify gaps and trends, and use this data to update the education response, policies and procedures.
- Report online safety concerns, as appropriate, to the Senior Leadership Team and Governing Body.
- Work with the Senior Leadership Team to review and update online safety policies on a regular basis (at least annually) with stakeholder input (where appropriate).
- Meet regularly with the governor with a lead responsibility for safeguarding and online safety.
- Meet regularly with the Online Safety Working Party (comprised of members of staff from a range of roles and to include pupils, governors, parents and representatives from the wider community when appropriate) to discuss online safety incidents, local and national Online Safety events, Online Safety Policy and Procedures, Online Safety Training, Online Safety Education for Pupils and any other associated or topical information which requires discussion or stakeholder input.

c. It is the responsibility of all members of staff to:

- Contribute to the development of online safety policies.
- Read and adhere to the online safety policy and acceptable use policies.
- Take responsibility for the security of setting systems and the data they use or have access to.
- Model good practice when using technology and maintain a professional level of conduct in their personal use of technology, both on and off site.
- Embed online safety education in curriculum delivery, wherever possible.
- Have an awareness of a range of online safety issues and how they may be experienced by the children in their care.
- Identify online safety concerns and take appropriate action by following the settings safeguarding policies and procedures.
- Know when and how to escalate online safety issues, including signposting to appropriate support, internally and externally.
- Take personal responsibility for professional development in this area.
- Monitor pupils when using electronic and internet enabled devices during teaching time.

- Keep a log of pupils using iPads or laptops as a teaching tool during lesson time.
- Know and contribute to the school filtering and monitoring processes.

d. It is the responsibility of staff managing the technical environment to:

- Provide technical support and perspective to the Online Safety Lead, Designated Safeguarding Lead and Senior Leadership team, especially in the development and implementation of appropriate online safety policies and procedures.
- Implement appropriate security measures as directed by Online Safety Lead, Designated Safeguarding Lead and Senior Leadership team (for example: each user has own log in from starting school which is password protected, Smoothwall filtering provides varying levels of access to the internet, firewalls housed and managed by County Council IT team, encrypted memory sticks are provided for all staff and encrypted email is available to ensure that the settings IT infrastructure/system is secure and not open to misuse or malicious attack, whilst allowing learning opportunities to be maximised.)
- Ensure that our filtering and monitoring procedures are applied and updated on a regular basis; responsibility for its implementation is shared with the Senior Leadership Team.
- Ensure that our filtering and monitoring systems are applied and updated on a regular basis; responsibility for its implementation is shared with the Senior Leadership Team.
- Ensure appropriate access and technical support is given to the Online Safety Lead, Designated Safeguarding Lead, any Deputy Safeguarding Leads and Senior Leadership team, to our filtering and monitoring systems, to enable them to take appropriate safeguarding action if/when required.
- Ensure that the technology & all processes are in line with the [Meeting digital and technology standards in schools and colleges - Filtering and monitoring standards for schools and colleges - Guidance - GOV.UK](#)

e. It is the responsibility of learners (at a level that is appropriate to their individual age and ability) to:

- Engage in age appropriate online safety education opportunities.
- Contribute to the development of online safety policies, where appropriate through school council meetings or attendance at working party meetings.
- Read and adhere to the acceptable use policies, with support from staff, parents and carers where required.
- Respect the feelings and rights of others both on and offline.
- Take responsibility for keeping themselves and others safe online.
- Seek help from a trusted adult, if there is a concern online, and support others that may be experiencing online safety issues.

f. It is the responsibility of parents and carers to:

- Read the acceptable use policies and encourage their children to adhere to them.
- Support our online safety approaches by discussing online safety issues with their children and reinforcing appropriate and safe online behaviours at home.
- Role model safe and appropriate use of technology and social media.
- Abide by Durham Trinity School and Sports College's acceptable use policies.
- Identify changes in behaviour that could indicate that their child is at risk of harm online.
- Seek help and support from the setting, or other appropriate agencies, if they or their child encounter risk or concerns online or if they require further information or support in order to develop their own understanding of new and emerging technologies and how to keep their children safe online.
- Notify school of any significant online safety incidents or concerns.
- Contribute to the development of the online safety policies through attendance at working party meetings or information sharing opportunities, where appropriate.
- Use our systems, such as learning programmes, and other network resources, safely and appropriately. (*For example: Weduc, Microsoft Teams, Google Classroom, Evidence for Learning*)
- Take responsibility for their own awareness in relation to the risks and opportunities posed by new and emerging technologies.
- Access National Online Safety advice guides, training materials and monthly updates to support their knowledge and understanding of Online Safety issues as recommended by the Safeguarding Team.

5. Education and Engagement Approaches

a. Education and engagement with learners

- Durham Trinity School and Sports College will establish and embed a progressive online safety curriculum to raise awareness and promote safe and responsible internet use amongst learners by:
 - Ensuring education regarding safe and responsible use precedes internet access.
 - Including Online Safety in Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE), Relationships, Health and Sex Education (RHSE) and Online Safety highlighted as part of Curriculum Learning (as identified on curriculum overview documentation).
 - Reinforcing online safety messages whenever technology or the internet is in use.
 - Educating learners in the effective use of the internet to research; including the skills of knowledge location, retrieval and evaluation.
 - Teaching learners to be critically aware of the materials they read and shown how to validate information before accepting its accuracy.
- Durham Trinity School and Sports College will support learners to read and understand the acceptable use policies in a way which suits their age and ability by:
 - Displaying acceptable use posters in all rooms with internet access and in communal areas around school.
 - Informing learners that network and internet use will be monitored for safety and security purposes and in accordance with legislation.

- Rewarding positive use of technology.
- Providing online safety education and training as part of the transition programme across the key stages and when moving between establishments.
- Seeking learner voice when writing and developing online safety policies and practices, including curriculum development and implementation, where appropriate.
- Using support, such as external visitors, where appropriate, to complement and support our internal online safety education approaches.

b. Vulnerable Learners

- Durham Trinity School and Sports College recognises that many of our learners are more vulnerable online due to a range of factors. This may include, but is not limited to, children looked after (CLA) or children with a social worker (CIN), children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) or children with emotional and mental health needs, children with English as an additional language (EAL) or children who have experienced trauma or loss.
- Durham Trinity School and Sports College will ensure that differentiated and ability appropriate online safety education, access and support is provided to vulnerable learners. (Further curriculum information is available within individual pathway curriculum documentation, the Online Safety suggested curriculum checklists, Evidence for Learning or teaching and learning policy documents).
- When implementing an appropriate online safety policy and curriculum Durham Trinity School and Sports College will seek input from specialist staff as appropriate, including the SENCO, CLA and CIN Designated Teacher, Curriculum Lead for Computing and Curriculum Lead for Relationships, Health and Sex Education (RHSE).

c. Training and engagement with staff

We will:

- Provide and discuss the online safety policy and procedures with all members of staff as part of induction.
- Provide up-to-date and appropriate online safety training for all staff on a regular basis, with at least annual updates.
 - This will be in the form of generalised training updates (through the use of National Online Safety Training Materials, as part of a cycle of Safeguarding CPD) and then regular updates and briefings during weekly whole school briefings (as required).
 - This will cover the potential risks posed to learners (Content, Contact, Commerce and Conduct) as well as our professional practice expectations.
- Recognise the expertise staff build by undertaking safeguarding training and managing safeguarding concerns and provide opportunities for staff to contribute to and shape online safety policies and procedures.
- Make staff aware that our IT systems are monitored, and that activity can be traced to individual users; staff will be reminded to behave professionally and in accordance with our policies when accessing our systems and devices.

- Make staff aware that their online conduct outside of the setting, including personal use of social media, could have an impact on their professional role and reputation.
- Highlight useful educational resources and tools which staff should use, according to the age and ability of the learners.
- Ensure all members of staff are aware of the procedures to follow regarding online safety concerns affecting learners, colleagues or other members of the community.

d. Awareness and engagement with parents and carers

- Durham Trinity School and Sports College recognises that parents and carers have an essential role to play in enabling children and young people to become safe and responsible users of the internet and associated technologies.
- We will build a partnership approach to online safety with parents and carers by:
 - Providing information and guidance on online safety in a variety of formats.
 - This will include offering specific online safety awareness training via National Online Safety's parent training platform, bulletins or key updates shared via Weduc and highlighting online safety at other events such as parent evenings, transition events, fetes and sports days.
 - Drawing their attention to the online safety policy, expectations and further information on new and emerging technologies in newsletters, letters and on our website.
 - Requesting that they read online safety information as part of joining our community, for example, within our Acceptable Use Policy Documents.
 - Requiring them to read our acceptable use policies and discuss the implications with their children.

6. Reducing Online Risks

- Durham Trinity School and Sports College recognises that the internet is a constantly changing environment with new apps, devices, websites and material emerging at a rapid pace.
- We will:
 - Regularly review the methods used to identify, assess and minimise online risks.
 - Examine emerging technologies for educational benefit and undertake appropriate risk assessments before use in the setting is permitted.
 - Ensure that appropriate filtering and monitoring is in place and take all reasonable precautions to ensure that users can only access appropriate material.
 - Recognise that due to the global and connected nature of the internet, it is not possible to guarantee that unsuitable material cannot be accessed via our computers or devices.
- All members of the community are made aware of our expectations regarding safe and appropriate behaviour online and the importance of not posting any content, comments, images or videos which could cause harm, distress or offence to members of the community. This is clearly outlined in our acceptable use policies and highlighted through a variety of education and training approaches.

7. Safer Use of Technology

a. Classroom Use

- Durham Trinity School and Sports College uses a wide range of technology. This includes access to: (Please note this list is not exhaustive)
 - Computers, laptops and other digital devices
 - Internet which may include search engines and educational websites
 - Email, if appropriate
 - Games consoles and other games-based technologies
 - Digital cameras and video cameras
 - iPads
 - Learning platforms such as Google Classrooms
- All setting owned devices will be used in accordance with our acceptable use policies and with appropriate safety and security measures in place.
 - Cameras and Facetime are disabled on all pupil iPads.
 - A system is used which allows central management of all iPads (MDM).
 - iPads are subject to the Smoothwall filtering system at student level.
 - Staff members create a list of which pupils are using which iPads when carrying out lesson activities. These will be filed appropriately to enable reference if required.
 - iPads will be dispatched via the Strategic Network and IT Development Manager.
 - Classes should book their iPad use on the appropriate online booking system.
- Members of staff will always evaluate websites, tools and apps fully before use in the classroom or before recommending for use at home.
- The setting will use age appropriate search tools following an informed risk assessment, to identify which tool best suits the needs of our community.
 - *Please note: The Smoothwall filtering system used in Durham Trinity School and Sports College ensures that when using Google it is automatically set to safe search. This reduces but does not eliminate the risk of links to inappropriate content.*
- We will ensure that the use of internet-derived materials, by staff and learners complies with copyright law and acknowledge the source of information.
- Supervision of learners will be appropriate to their age and ability.
 - **Early Years Foundation Stage and Key Stage 1**
 - Access to the internet will be by adult demonstration, with occasional directly supervised access to specific and approved online materials, which supports the learning outcomes planned for the learners' age and ability.
 - **Key Stage 2**
 - Learners will use age-appropriate search engines and online tools.
 - Learners will be directed by the teacher to online materials and resources which support the learning outcomes planned for the learners' age and ability.
 - Learners will be directly supervised whilst accessing online materials.
 - **Key Stage 3, 4, 5**
 - Learners will be appropriately supervised when using technology, according to their ability and understanding.

- Learners will be directed by the teacher to online materials and resources which support the learning outcomes planned for the learners' age and ability.

b. Managing Internet Access

- All staff and visitors will read and sign an acceptable use policy before being given access to our computer system, IT resources or internet.
- Where appropriate, learners will read and sign an acceptable use policy before being given access to our computer system, IT resources or internet. Parents are able to sign an acceptable use policy on behalf of their child too.

c. Filtering and Monitoring

i Decision Making

- Durham Trinity School and Sport College Governors and Senior Leaders, in association with the Strategic Network and IT Development Manager, have ensured that our setting has age and ability appropriate filtering and monitoring in place, to limit learner's exposure to online risks.
- The governors and leaders are aware of the need to prevent "over blocking", as that may unreasonably restrict what can be taught, with regards to online activities and safeguarding.
- Our decision regarding filtering and monitoring has been informed by a risk assessment, considering our specific needs and circumstances.
- Changes to the filtering and monitoring approach will be risk assessed by staff with educational and technical experience and, where appropriate, with consent from the leadership team; all changes to the filtering policy are logged and recorded.
- The leadership team will ensure that regular checks are made to ensure that the filtering and monitoring methods are effective and appropriate.
- All members of staff are aware that they cannot rely on filtering and monitoring alone to safeguard learners; effective classroom management and regular education about safe and responsible use is essential.
- We will ensure that we will refer to relevant filtering & monitoring DFE guidance in the use of AI in school: [Generative AI: product safety expectations - GOV.UK.](#)

ii Filtering

- Education broadband connectivity is provided through Durham County Council.
- We use Smoothwall which blocks sites which can be categorised as: pornography, racial hatred, extremism, gaming and sites of an illegal nature. Smoothwall also highlights safeguarding categories. The Safeguarding categories are - abuse, adult content, bullying, criminal activity, radicalisation, substance abuse and suicide. Smoothwall can also be used to filter many other categories for example social media, shopping etc as well as custom blocks.
- The filtering system blocks all sites on the [Internet Watch Foundation](#) (IWF) list.
- We work with our Strategic Network and IT Development Manager to ensure that our filtering policy is continually reviewed.

- All school devices will be connected to a filtered feed. If a school device needs access to additional content, for instance to manage official social media, the filter settings for that device or user can be modified to allow access to that content when permission from the Head teacher has been sought.
- If learners discover unsuitable sites, they will be required to:
 - Turn off the monitor or screen (if possible) and immediately report to a member of staff.
 - The member of staff will report the concern (including the URL of the site if possible) to the Online Safety Lead or Strategic Network and IT Development Manager where possible. In the event that neither of these staff are available it should be reported to a member of the Safeguarding Team.
 - The breach will be recorded and escalated as appropriate.
 - Parents/carers will be informed of filtering breaches involving their child, where appropriate.
- Any material believed to be illegal will be reported immediately to the appropriate agencies, such as the UK Safer Internet Centre, Durham Police or CEOP.

iii **Monitoring**

- We will appropriately monitor internet use on all setting owned or provided internet enabled devices. This is achieved by:
 - Physical monitoring and supervision.
 - Smoothwall Filtering.
 - Daily, Weekly and Monthly Smoothwall Alerts. These reports are sent to the Designated Online Safety Lead, Designated Safeguarding Lead and Strategic Network and IT Development Manager who collaborate to investigate the alerts and take the appropriate action.
- If a concern is identified via monitoring approaches we will:
 - Log any concerns via the appropriate monitoring log and via CPOMS.
 - Report any safeguarding concerns via the appropriate Child Protection Procedures.
 - The Designated Online Safety Lead, Designated Safeguarding Lead or members of the Safeguarding Team will then respond according to the Safeguarding and Child Protection policy documentation.
- All users will be informed that use of our systems can be monitored and that all monitoring will be in line with data protection, human rights and privacy legislation.
- We will use the [Plan technology for your school - GOV.UK](#) to assess ourselves against the filtering and monitoring standards and receive personalised recommendations on how to meet them.

d. **Managing Personal Data Online**

- Personal data will be recorded, processed, transferred and made available online in accordance with General Data Protection Regulations and Data Protection legislation.
 - Full information can be found in our Data Protection policy.

e. **Security and Management of Information Systems**

- We take appropriate steps to ensure the security of our information systems, including:
 - Virus protection being updated regularly.
 - Encryption for personal data sent over the Internet or taken off site.
 - Use of setting provided password encrypted memory sticks.
 - Not downloading unapproved software to work devices or opening unfamiliar email attachments.
 - Regularly checking files held on our network,
 - The appropriate use of user logins and passwords to access our network.
 - Specific user logins and passwords will be enforced for users, where appropriate.
 - All users **must** log off or lock their screens/devices if systems are unattended.
 - Please see the Strategic Network and IT Development Manager and the technical environment safety and security audit document for further information.

f. Password policy

- All members of staff will have their own unique username and private passwords to access our systems; members of staff are responsible for keeping their password private.
- From Key Stage 2 all learners are provided with their own unique username and private passwords to access our systems; learners (in association with the staff who support them) are responsible for keeping their password private.
- We require all staff users to:
 - Use strong passwords for access into our system (at least 8 characters long with at least 3 different character types).
 - Change their passwords every 90 days.
 - Always keep their password private; users must not share it with others or leave it where others can find it.
 - Not to login as another user at any time.

g. Managing the Safety of our Website

- We will ensure that information posted on our website meets the requirements as identified by the Department for Education (DfE). [What maintained schools must or should publish online - GOV.UK](#).
- We will ensure that our website complies with guidelines for publications including: accessibility; data protection; respect for intellectual property rights; privacy policies and copyright.
- Staff or learner's personal information will not be published on our website; the contact details on the website will be our setting address, email and telephone number.
- The administrator account for our website will be secured with an appropriately strong password.
- We will post appropriate information about safeguarding, including online safety, on our website for members of the community.

h. Publishing Images and Videos Online

- We will ensure that all images and videos shared online are used in accordance with the associated policies, including (but not limited to) the: photographic consent policy, data security, acceptable use policies, codes of conduct/behaviour, social media and use of personal devices and mobile phones.

i. Managing Email

- Access to our email systems will always take place in accordance with data protection legislation and in line with other policies, including confidentiality, acceptable use policies and the code of conduct/behaviour policy.
 - The forwarding of any chain messages/emails is not permitted.
 - Spam or junk mail will be blocked and reported to the email provider.
 - Any electronic communication which contains sensitive or personal information will only be sent using secure and encrypted email.
 - Setting email addresses and other official contact details will not be used for setting up personal social media accounts.
- Members of the community will immediately tell Mrs Fiona Day (Assistant Headteacher with responsibility for Online Safety), Mr Jack Peacock (Assistant Headteacher Designated Safeguarding Lead and Deputy Online Safety Lead) or Mr Mark Linney (Strategic Network and IT Development Manager) if they receive offensive communication, and this will be recorded appropriately.
- Excessive social media or email use can interfere with teaching and learning and will be restricted; access to external personal email accounts may be blocked on site.

i Staff email

- The use of personal email addresses by staff for any official setting business is not permitted at any time.
 - All members of staff are provided with an email address to use for all official communication.
- Members of staff are encouraged to have an appropriate work life balance when responding to email, especially if communication is taking place between staff, learners and parents.

j. Management of live online meetings and lessons

- Our school recognises that the use of live online meetings / lessons may be used to enhance the learning opportunities of our pupils and can bring a range of learning benefits.
- Staff will ensure that live online meetings / lessons are suitably risk assessed.
- When necessary, we use a combination of live teaching (online lessons) and recorded teaching (e.g. video / audio recordings made by teachers) to teach pupils remotely.

Keeping devices secure

- All staff members will take appropriate steps to ensure their devices remain secure. This includes, but is not limited to:

- Keeping the device password-protected – strong passwords are at least 8 characters, with a combination of upper and lower-case letters, numbers and special characters (e.g. asterisk or currency symbol)
- Ensuring the hard drive is encrypted – this means if the device is lost or stolen, no one can access the files stored on the hard drive by attaching it to a new device
- Making sure the device locks if left inactive for a period of time
- Not sharing the device among family or friends
- Installing antivirus and anti-spyware software
- Keeping operating systems up to date – always install the latest updates

Users

- Staff will ensure that only staff and pupil school accounts and systems are used to access live online meetings/lessons.
- Only key administrators will be given access to online lesson administration areas.

Content

- When recording a live online lesson/meeting, it should be made clear to all parties at the start of the session. The reason for the recording must be given and recorded material will be stored securely. Staff must be aware of any child who does not have consent to be photographed or filmed and should make appropriate adjustments to safeguard.
- If third party materials are included, we will check that recording is permitted to avoid infringing the third-party intellectual property rights.
- We will establish dialogue with external partners before taking part in a live online lesson. If it is a non-educational establishment, staff will check that the material they are delivering is appropriate for the learners.

k. Management of Learning Programmes

- Durham Trinity School uses Weduc and Google Classroom as its official learning platforms.
- Leaders and staff will regularly monitor the usage of the Learning Platform (LP), including message/communication tools and publishing facilities.
- It is the responsibility of the companies, from which Online Learning Programmes are purchased, to ensure all content, communication tools and copyright legislation are monitored and adhered to. Examples of other learning programmes used by Durham Trinity School and Sports College are: Lexia, Education City, Espresso and Help Kidz Learn, MyMaths.
- Only current members of staff, learners and parents/carers will have access to the LP.
- When staff *and/or* learners leave the setting, their account will be disabled.
- Learners and staff will be advised about acceptable conduct and use when using the LP.
- All users will be mindful of copyright and will only upload appropriate content onto the LP.
- A visitor may be invited onto the LP by a member of the leadership; in this instance, there may be an agreed focus or a limited time slot.
- Any concerns about content on the LP will be recorded and dealt with in the following ways:
 - The user will be asked to remove any material deemed to be inappropriate or offensive.

- If the user does not comply, the material will be removed by the site administrator.
- Access to the LP for the user may be suspended.
- The user will need to discuss the issues with a member of Senior Leadership before reinstatement.
- A learner's parents/carers may be informed.
- If the content is illegal, we will respond in line with existing child protection procedures.

I. Management of Applications (apps) used to share Children's Achievements and record Children's progress

- We use Weduc and Evidence for Learning to share appropriate information and learner achievements with parents and carers. Evidence for Learning is used to record pupil progress too.
- We use Google Classroom for online lessons, where there is the capacity to offer direct feedback on pupil work. This will be done in accordance with the School's Marking and Feedback policy.
- The Headteacher is ultimately responsible for the security of any data or images held of children. As such, they will ensure that the use of systems is appropriately risk assessed prior to use, and that they are used in accordance with data protection legislation, including the General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) and Data Protection legislation.
- To safeguard learner's data:
 - Only school issued devices will be used for apps that record and store learners' personal details, attainment or photographs.
 - Personal staff mobile phones or devices will NOT be used to upload content to any apps which record and store learners' personal details, attainment or images.
 - Staff may use a personal mobile phone or device to access communications shared with them, via the application, outside of working hours.
 - Devices will be appropriately secured, via a fingerprint identification, PIN code etc., if taken off site, to reduce the risk of a data security breach, in the event of loss or theft.
 - All users will be advised regarding safety measures, such as using strong passwords and logging out of systems.
 - Parents and carers will be informed of the expectations regarding safe and appropriate use, prior to being given access; for example, not sharing passwords or images.

8. Social Media

a. Expectations

- The expectations' regarding safe and responsible use of social media applies to all members of the Durham Trinity School and Sports College community.
- The term social media may include (but is not limited to): blogs; wikis; social networking sites; forums; bulletin boards; online gaming; apps; video/photo sharing sites; chatrooms and instant messenger.

- All members of the Durham Trinity School and Sports College community are expected to engage in social media in a positive, safe and responsible manner.
 - All members of the Durham Trinity School and Sports College community are advised not to publish specific and detailed private thoughts, concerns, pictures or messages on any social media services, especially content that may be considered threatening, hurtful or defamatory to others.
- We will control learner and staff access to social media whilst using setting provided devices and systems on site by ensuring that Social Media is blocked when accessing Durham Trinity School and Sports College's network.
 - The use of social media during teaching time for personal use is not permitted.
 - Inappropriate or excessive use of social media during setting hours or whilst using setting devices may result in disciplinary or legal action and/or removal of internet facilities.
- Concerns regarding the online conduct of any member of the Durham Trinity School and Sports College community on social media, should be reported to the Online Safety Lead, Designated Safeguarding Lead or a member of the Safeguarding Team and will be managed in accordance with our anti-bullying, allegations against staff, behaviour, staff code of conduct and child protection policies.

b. Staff Personal Use of Social Media

- The safe and responsible use of social networking, social media and personal publishing sites will be discussed with all members of staff as part of staff induction and will be revisited and communicated via regular staff training opportunities and whole school staff meetings.
- Safe and professional behaviour will be outlined for all members of staff (including volunteers) as part of our code of conduct/behaviour policy as part of acceptable use policy.

Reputation

- All members of staff are advised that their online conduct on social media can have an impact on their role and reputation within the setting.
 - Civil, legal or disciplinary action may be taken if staff are found to bring the profession or institution into disrepute, or if something is felt to have undermined confidence in their professional abilities.
- All members of staff are advised to safeguard themselves and their privacy when using social media sites. Advice will be provided to staff via staff training and by sharing appropriate guidance and resources on a regular basis. This will include (but is not limited to):
 - Setting the privacy levels of their personal sites.
 - Being aware of location sharing services.
 - Opting out of public listings on social networking sites.
 - Logging out of accounts after use.
 - Keeping passwords safe and confidential.
 - Ensuring staff do not represent their personal views as that of the setting.
- Members of staff **should** not identify themselves as employees of Durham Trinity School and Sports College on their personal social networking accounts; this is to prevent information on these sites from being linked with the setting, and to safeguard the privacy of staff members.

- All members of staff are encouraged to carefully consider the information, including text and images, they share and post online and to ensure that their social media use is compatible with their professional role and is in accordance our policies and the wider professional and legal framework.
- Information and content that staff members have access to as part of their employment, including photos and personal information about learners and their family members or colleagues will not be shared or discussed on social media sites.
- Members of staff will notify the Senior Leadership Team immediately if they consider that any content shared on social media sites conflicts with their role.

Communicating with learners and parents and carers

- All members of staff are advised **not** to communicate with or add as 'friends' any current or past learners or their family members via any personal social media sites, applications or profiles.
 - Any pre-existing relationships or exceptions that may compromise this will be discussed with the Headteacher.
 - If ongoing contact with learners is required once they have left the setting, members of staff will be expected to use official setting provided communication tools.
- Staff will not use personal social media accounts to contact learners or parents, nor should any contact be accepted, except in circumstance whereby prior approval has been given by the Headteacher.
- Any communication from learners and parents received on personal social media accounts will be reported to the Online Safety Lead, Designated Safeguarding Lead or a member of the Senior Leadership Team.

c. Learners Personal Use of Social Media

- Safe and appropriate use of social media will be taught to learners as part of an embedded and progressive education approach, via age appropriate sites and resources.
- We are aware that many popular social media sites state that they are not for children under the age of 13, therefore we will not create accounts specifically for learners under this age.
- Any concerns regarding learners use of social media will be dealt with in accordance with existing policies, including anti-bullying and behaviour.
 - Concerns will be shared with parents/carers as appropriate, particularly when concerning underage use of social media sites, games or tools.
- Learners will be advised:
 - To consider the benefits and risks of sharing personal details on social media sites which could identify them and/or their location.
 - To only approve and invite known friends on social media sites and to deny access to others by making profiles private.
 - Not to meet any online friends without a parent/carer or other responsible adult's permission and only when a trusted adult is present.
 - To use safe passwords.
 - To use social media sites which are appropriate for their age and abilities.

- How to block and report unwanted communications.
- How to report concerns both within the setting and externally.

d. Official Use of Social Media

- Durham Trinity School and Sports College has no officially endorsed Social Media Platforms at this time.

9. Use of Mobile and Smart Technology

- Durham Trinity School and Sports College recognises that personal communication through mobile technologies is an accepted part of everyday life for learners, staff and parents/carers, but technologies need to be used safely and appropriately within the setting.

a. Expectations

- All use of personal devices (including but not limited to; tablets, games consoles and ‘smart’ watches) and mobile phones will take place in accordance with the law and other appropriate policies, such as anti-bullying, behaviour and child protection/safeguarding.
- Electronic devices of any kind that are brought onto site are the responsibility of the user.
 - All members of the Durham Trinity School and Sports College community are advised to take steps to protect their mobile phones or devices from loss, theft or damage; we accept no responsibility for the loss, theft or damage of such items on our premises.
 - All members of the Durham Trinity School and Sports College community are advised to use passwords/pin numbers to ensure that unauthorised calls or actions cannot be made on their phones or devices; passwords and pin numbers should be kept confidential and mobile phones and personal devices should not be shared.
- Mobile phones and personal devices are not permitted to be used in specific areas within the site such as changing rooms, toilets and swimming pools.
- The sending of abusive or inappropriate messages or content via mobile phones or personal devices is forbidden by any member of the community; any breaches will be dealt with as part of our behaviour or code of conduct policies.
- All members of the Durham Trinity School and Sports College community are advised to ensure that their mobile phones and personal devices do not contain any content which may be offensive, derogatory or would otherwise contravene our behaviour or child protection policies.
- All members of the Durham Trinity School and Sports College community are reminded that taking covert images typically under clothing (Upskirting) is illegal and will be dealt with as part of the discipline policy.

b. Staff Use of Mobile and Smart Technology

- Members of staff will ensure that use of personal phones and devices takes place in accordance with the law, as well as, relevant policy and procedures, such as: confidentiality, child protection, data security, code of conduct and acceptable use.
- Staff will be advised to:
 - Keep mobile phones and personal devices in a safe and secure place such as a locked drawer or cupboard or their locker during teaching time.
 - Keep mobile phones and personal devices switched off or switched to 'silent' mode during teaching time.
 - Ensure that Bluetooth or other forms of communication (such as 'airdrop') are hidden or disabled during teaching time.
 - Not use personal devices during teaching periods, unless permission has been given by the Headteacher, such as in emergency circumstances.
 - Ensure that any content bought onto site via mobile phones and personal devices are compatible with their professional role and expectations.
 - Only use personal devices in designated areas which are the Staff Prep Room, Offices, The Staff Room, an empty classroom (that is not currently in use by pupils) and the Staff Car Park whilst the pupils are present.
- If a staff member chooses to wear a smart watch, these can be worn but during the school day the camera, messaging services, call services and notifications must be disabled. Use of smart watches should be limited to non-contact time when no pupils are present and should only be within the designated areas noted above. It is advised that staff security protect access to the functions of their smart watch too.
- Members of staff are **NOT** permitted to use their own personal phones or devices for contacting learners or parents and carers.
 - Any pre-existing relationships, which could undermine this, will be discussed with the Headteacher.
- Staff will not use personal devices (such as mobile phones or smart watches):
 - To take photos or videos of learners and will only use work-provided equipment for this purpose.
 - Directly with learners and will only use work-provided equipment during lessons/educational activities.
- If a member of staff breaches our policy, action will be taken in line with our code of conduct/staff behaviour and allegations policy
 - If a member of staff is thought to have illegal content saved or stored on a mobile phone or personal device or have committed a criminal offence, the police will be contacted.

c. Learners Use of Mobile and Smart Technology

- Learners will be educated regarding the safe and appropriate use of personal devices and mobile phones and will be made aware of boundaries and consequences.
- Durham Trinity School and Sports College expects learners' personal devices and mobile phones to be only brought into school if needed for valid and pre-agreed reason. All devices should be kept out of sight of others during the transition from classroom to taxi and vice versa. Devices should be handed to a class teacher for safe storage on arrival to the

classroom. In the absence of a class teacher, the devices should be handed to a Pathway Leader or a Member of the Senior Leadership Team. A home/school mobile phone agreement will be signed by parents, pupils and the class teacher or Pathway Leader if pupils are to bring mobile devices to school on a regular basis. The agreement outlines that the school take no responsibility for any damage to the devices whilst on the school premises but that the school agree to lock the devices away in a secure location.

- If a learner needs to contact his/her parents or carers they will be allowed to use an office telephone.
- Parents are advised to contact their child via the setting office.
- Mobile phones or personal devices will not be used by learners during lessons or formal educational time.
 - If members of staff have an educational reason to allow learners to use their mobile phones or personal devices as part of an educational activity, it will only take place when approved by the Senior Leadership Team and when an appropriate risk assessment has taken place.
- Mobile phones and personal devices must not be taken into examinations.
 - Learners found in possession of a mobile phone or personal device during an exam will be reported to the appropriate examining body. This may result in the withdrawal from either that examination or all examinations which would be decided by the appropriate awarding body.
- If a learner breaches the policy, pupils will be asked to hand their device to a class teacher, Pathway Leader or a member of the Senior Leadership Team. If the pupil remains unwilling to hand in their device, the phone or device will be confiscated and will be held in a secure place.
 - Staff may confiscate a learner's mobile phone or device if they believe it is being used to contravene our behaviour or bullying policy or could contain youth produced sexual imagery (sexting).
 - Searches of mobile phone or personal devices will only be carried out in accordance with DfE guidance: www.gov.uk/government/publications/searching-screening-and-confiscation
 - Learners mobile phones or devices may be searched by a member of the leadership team, with the consent of the learner or a parent/ carer. Content may be deleted or requested to be deleted, if it contravenes our policies. This is in accordance with DfE guidance: www.gov.uk/government/publications/searching-screening-and-confiscation
 - Mobile phones and devices that have been confiscated will be released to pupils if it is the first occasion. If this pattern of behaviour continues the confiscated device would be handed to a taxi driver, escort, parent or carer as agreed with the pupil's parent or carer on an individual situation basis.
 - If there is suspicion that material on a learner's personal device or mobile phone may be illegal or may provide evidence relating to a criminal offence, the device will be handed over to the police for further investigation.

Smart Watches

- Durham Trinity School and Sports College recognises that on some occasions it may be helpful for a pupil to bring a mobile device (such as a smart watch) into school, for instance, if a pupil is tracking their exercise or step counts for the day. We also recognise that with

support, these devices can play a big role in helping to develop independence, such as by setting timed reminders etc. We do however believe that pupil use of these devices during the school day could also potentially disrupt and distract them from their learning, which we would like to prevent.

- Durham Trinity School and Sports College expects pupils choosing to wear a smart watch to return a Smart Watch agreement signed by their parent/carer. By signing the aforementioned agreement they will agree to adhere to the following expectations:
 - Smart watches brought into school are the sole responsibility of the pupil and school will not accept any responsibility for damage or loss.
 - Smart watches with camera, internet, call and messaging facilities **must have all** of these features disabled before being brought into school in order to safeguard the pupil, other pupils and other members of the school community.
 - In order to maintain security, a pin number or password **must** be in place.
- If a learner needs to contact his/her parents or carers they will be allowed to use an office telephone. Parents are advised to contact their child via the setting office.
- Pupils not following these rules will **not** be allowed to bring their device into school. Any device brought in without permission will, on the first occasion, be locked in a teacher's drawer and returned at the end of the school day and, on the second occasion, will be returned to a parent/carer.
- Any pupils for whom learning is disrupted or who put themselves or others at risk with the use of their watch will be asked to remove it and it will be stored by the teacher until the end of the school day.
- Staff may confiscate a learner's smart watch if they believe it is being used to contravene our behaviour or bullying policy or could contain youth produced sexual imagery (sexting). Searches of a smart watch will only be carried out in accordance with DfE guidance: www.gov.uk/government/publications/searching-screening-and-confiscation. Learners smart watches may be searched by a member of the leadership team, with the consent of the learner or a parent/ carer (where possible). Content may be deleted or requested to be deleted, if it contravenes our policies. This is in accordance with DfE guidance: www.gov.uk/government/publications/searching-screening-and-confiscation

d. Visitors' Use of Mobile and Smart Technology

- Parents/carers and visitors (including volunteers and contractors) must use their mobile phones and personal devices in accordance with our acceptable use policy and other associated policies, such as: anti-bullying, behaviour, child protection and image use.
- We will ensure appropriate signage and information is displayed and provided to inform parents, carers and visitors of expectations of use.
- Members of staff are expected to challenge visitors if they have concerns and will always inform the Online Safety Lead, Designated Safeguarding Lead or a member of the Safeguarding Team of any breaches our policy.

e. Officially provided mobile phones and devices

- Members of staff will be issued with a work email address, where contact with learners or parents/ carers is required.

- Members of the Senior Leadership Team, The Caretakers, The Strategic Network and IT Development Manager and the Parent Support Advisor will be issued with a work mobile telephone number.
- Setting mobile phones and devices will be suitably protected via a passcode/password/pin/facial recognition software and must only be accessed or used by authorised members of staff.
- Setting mobile phones and devices will always be used in accordance with the acceptable use policy and other relevant policies.

10. Responding to Online Safety Incidents and Concerns

- All members of the community will be made aware of the reporting procedure for online safety concerns, including: breaches of filtering, youth produced sexual imagery (sexting/nudes), cyberbullying and illegal content.
- All members of the community must respect confidentiality and the need to follow the official procedures for reporting concerns.
 - Learners, parents and staff will be informed of our complaints procedure and staff will be made aware of the whistleblowing procedure.
- We require staff, parents, carers and learners to work in partnership to resolve online safety issues.
- After any investigations are completed, we will debrief, identify lessons learnt and implement any policy or curriculum changes as required.
- The school will follow the NSPCC guidance on when to contact the Police available here :- <https://www.npcc.police.uk/documents/Children%20and%20Young%20people/When%20to%20call%20the%20police%20guidance%20for%20schools%20and%20colleges.pdf>
- If an incident or concern needs to be passed beyond our community (for example if other local settings are involved or the public may be at risk), the Online Safety Lead, Designated Safeguarding Lead or Headteacher will speak with Durham Police first to ensure that potential investigations are not compromised.

a. Concerns about Learners Welfare

- The Online Safety Lead or a member of the Safeguarding Team will be informed of any online safety incidents involving safeguarding or child protection concerns.
 - The Online Safety Lead or a member of the Safeguarding Team will record these issues in line with our child protection policy with the support of the member of staff reporting the concern.
- The Online Safety Lead or a member of the Safeguarding Team will ensure that online safety concerns are escalated and reported to relevant agencies in line with the DURHAM SAFEGUARDING CHILDREN PARTNERSHIP thresholds and procedures.
- We will inform parents and carers of online safety incidents or concerns involving their child, as and when required.

b. Staff Misuse

- Any complaint about staff misuse will be referred to the Headteacher, in accordance with the code of conduct policy.
- Issues which do not meet the threshold requiring reporting to the LADO will be recorded in the schools record of low level concerns.
- Any allegations regarding a member of staff's online conduct reaching the threshold will be discussed with the LADO (Local Authority Designated Officer).
- Appropriate action will be taken in accordance with our staff disciplinary/code of conduct policies.

11. Procedures for Responding to Specific Online Incidents or Concerns

a. Online Sexual Violence and Sexual Harassment between Children

- Our setting has accessed and understood "[Sexual violence and sexual harassment between children in schools and colleges](#)" (2021) guidance and part 5 of 'Keeping children safe in education' 2025.
- Durham Trinity School and Sports College recognises that sexual violence and sexual harassment between children can take place online. Examples may include; non-consensual sharing of sexual images and videos, sexualised online bullying, online coercion and threats, unwanted sexual comments and messages on social media, and online sexual exploitation.
- Full details of how we will respond to concerns relating to sexual violence and sexual harassment between children can be found within our child protection policy in Section N, anti-bullying policy and child on child abuse policy.
- Durham Trinity School and Sports College recognises that internet brings the potential for the impact of any sexual violence and sexual harassment concerns to extend further than the local community, and for a victim or alleged perpetrator to become marginalised and excluded by online communities.
- Durham Trinity School and Sports College also recognises the potential for repeat victimisation in the future if abusive content continues to exist somewhere online.
- Durham Trinity School and Sports College will ensure that all members of the community are made aware of the potential social, psychological and criminal consequences of online sexual violence and sexual harassment between children by implementing a range of age and ability appropriate educational methods as part of our PSHE and RHSE curriculum.
- We will ensure that all members of the community are aware of sources of support regarding online sexual violence and sexual harassment between children.
- We will respond to concerns regarding online sexual violence and sexual harassment between children, regardless of whether the incident took place on our premises or using our equipment.
- If made aware of online sexual violence and sexual harassment, we will:
 - Immediately notify the Online Safety Lead, Designated Safeguarding Lead or a member of the Safeguarding Team and act in accordance with our child protection and anti-bullying policies.

- If content is contained on learners' electronic devices, they will be managed in accordance with the DfE '[searching screening and confiscation](#)' advice.
- Provide the necessary safeguards and support for all learners involved, such as offering specific advice on blocking, reporting and removing online content, as well as providing appropriate counselling/pastoral support.
- Implement appropriate sanctions in accordance with our behaviour policy. (Please refer to our behaviour/emotional wellbeing policy for further information).
- Inform parents and carers, if appropriate, about the incident and how it is being managed.
- If appropriate, make a referral to partner agencies, such as First Contact and/or the Police.
- If the concern involves children and young people at a different educational setting, work in partnership with other Designated Safeguarding Leads to ensure appropriate safeguarding action is taken in the wider local community.
 - If a criminal offence has been committed, a member of the Safeguarding Team will discuss this with Durham Police first to ensure that investigations are not compromised.
- Review the handling of any incidents to ensure that best practice was implemented, and policies/procedures are appropriate.

i Youth Produced Sexual Imagery (“Nudes”)

- Durham Trinity School and Sports College recognises youth produced sexual imagery (known as “nudes”) as a safeguarding issue; all concerns will be reported to and dealt with by the Online Safety Lead, Designated Safeguarding Lead or a member of the Safeguarding Team.
- This section only applies to young people under the age of 18 creating/sharing/receiving nudes of a young person. It does not apply to children sharing adult pornography. On any occasion when an adult is in possession of or is sharing an illegal image of a young person – this will always be an urgent police matter.
- We will follow the advice set out by the DfE here <https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/sharing-nudes-and-semi-nudes-advice-for-education-settings-working-with-children-and-young-people> a summary of the guidance is now an appendix of the school safeguarding policy.
- Durham Trinity School and Sports College will ensure that all members of the community are made aware of the potential social, psychological and criminal consequences of ‘sexting’/ ‘nudes’ by implementing preventative approaches, via a range of age and ability appropriate educational methods.
- We will ensure that all members of the community are aware of sources of support regarding youth produced sexual imagery.
- We will respond to concerns regarding youth produced sexual imagery, regardless of whether the incident took place on site or using setting provided or personal equipment.
- Review the handling of any incidents to ensure that best practice was implemented; the leadership team will also review and update any management procedures, where necessary.

b. Online Child Sexual Abuse and Exploitation (including child criminal exploitation)

- Durham Trinity School and Sports College will ensure that all members of the community are aware of online child sexual abuse, including: exploitation and grooming; the consequences; possible approaches which may be employed by offenders to target children and how to respond to concerns.
- Durham Trinity School and Sports College recognises online child sexual abuse and exploitation (including criminal exploitation) as a safeguarding issue and, as such, all concerns will be reported to and dealt with by the Online Safety Lead or a member of the Safeguarding Team.
- Durham Trinity School and Sports College wants to raise awareness that a criminal offence has been committed if a person aged 18 or over intentionally communicates with a child under 16, who the adult does not reasonably believe to be 16 or over, if the communication is sexual or if it is intended to encourage the child to make a communication which is sexual. The offence will be committed whether or not the child communicates with the adult. This is the offence of sexual communication with a child under section 67 of the Serious Crime Act 2015.
- We will implement preventative approaches for online child sexual abuse and exploitation (including criminal exploitation) via a range of age and ability appropriate education for learners, staff and parents/carers.
- We will ensure that all members of the community are aware of the support available regarding online child sexual abuse and exploitation (including criminal exploitation), both locally and nationally.
- We will ensure that the 'Click CEOP' report button is visible on our website and available to learners and other members of our community.
- If made aware of incident involving online child sexual abuse and exploitation (including criminal exploitation), we will:
 - Act in accordance with our child protection policies and the relevant Durham Safeguarding Children Partnership procedures.
 - If appropriate, store any devices involved securely.
 - Make a referral to First Contact (if required/appropriate) and immediately inform Durham Police via 101, or 999 if a child is at immediate risk.
 - Carry out a risk assessment which considers any vulnerabilities of learner(s) involved (including carrying out relevant checks with other agencies).
 - Inform parents/carers about the incident and how it is being managed.
 - Provide the necessary safeguards and support for learners, such as, offering counselling or pastoral support.
 - Review the handling of any incidents to ensure that best practice is implemented; leadership team will review and update any management procedures, where necessary.
- We will respond to concerns regarding online child sexual abuse and exploitation (including criminal exploitation), regardless of whether the incident took place on our premises or using setting provided or personal equipment.

- Where possible, learners will be involved in decision making and if appropriate, will be empowered to report concerns such as via the Click CEOP report:

- If we are unclear whether a criminal offence has been committed, the Online Safety Lead, Designated Safeguarding Lead or a member of the Safeguarding Team will obtain advice immediately through Education Durham, The Durham Safeguarding Children Partnership or Durham Police.
- If learners at other setting are believed to have been targeted, the Online Safety Lead, Designated Safeguarding Lead or a member of the Safeguarding Team will seek support from Durham Police and/or Education Durham first to ensure that potential investigations are not compromised.

c. Indecent Images of Children (IIOC)

- Durham Trinity School and Sports College will ensure that all members of the community are made aware of the possible consequences of accessing Indecent Images of Children (IIOC).
- We will respond to concerns regarding IIOC on our equipment and/or personal equipment, even if access took place off site.
- We will seek to prevent accidental access to IIOC by using an internet Service provider (ISP) which subscribes to the Internet Watch Foundation block list and by implementing appropriate filtering, firewalls and anti-spam software.
- If we are unclear if a criminal offence has been committed, the Online Safety Lead or a member of the safeguarding team will obtain advice immediately through Durham Police and/or the Education Safeguarding Team.
- If made aware of IIOC, we will:
 - Act in accordance with our child protection policy and the relevant Durham Safeguarding Children Partnership procedures.
 - Store any devices involved securely.
 - Immediately inform appropriate organisations, such as CEOP, Durham Police or the LADO.
- If made aware that a member of staff or a learner has been inadvertently exposed to indecent images of children, we will:
 - Ensure that the Online Safety Lead, Designated Safeguarding Lead or a member of the safeguarding team is informed.
 - Ensure that the URLs (webpage addresses) which contain the suspect images are reported to the Internet Watch Foundation via www.iwf.org.uk .
 - Ensure that any copies that exist of the image, for example in emails, are deleted.
 - Report concerns, as appropriate to parents and carers.
- If made aware that indecent images of children have been found on the setting provided devices, we will:
 - Ensure that the Online Safety Lead, Designated Safeguarding Lead or a member of the safeguarding team is informed.

- Ensure that the URLs (webpage addresses) which contain the suspect images are reported to the Internet Watch Foundation via www.iwf.org.uk .
 - Ensure that any copies that exist of the image, for example in emails, are deleted.
 - Inform the police via 101 (999 if there is an immediate risk of harm) and First Contact
 - Only store copies of images (securely, where no one else has access to them and delete all other copies) at the request of the police.
 - Report concerns, as appropriate to parents and carers.
- If made aware that a member of staff is in possession of indecent images of children on setting provided devices, we will:
 - Ensure that the Headteacher is informed in line with our managing allegations against staff policy.
 - Inform the Local Authority Designated Officer (LADO) and other relevant organisations in accordance with our managing allegations against staff policy.
 - Quarantine any devices until police advice has been sought.

d. Child Criminal Exploitation – Including County Lines

- All staff need to be aware of the indicators that a child may be at risk from, or involved with Child Criminal Exploitation (CCE) and note that this can be facilitated through the use of technology. Further details are in the schools safeguarding policy.

e. Cyberbullying

- Cyberbullying, along with all other forms of bullying, will not be tolerated at Durham Trinity School and Sports College.
- Full details of how we will respond to cyberbullying are set out in our anti-bullying policy which is available on the school website.

f. Online Hate

- Online hate content, directed towards or posted by, specific members of the community will not be tolerated at Durham Trinity School and Sports College and will be responded to in line with existing policies, including anti-bullying and behaviour.
- All members of the community will be advised to report online hate in accordance with relevant policies and procedures.
- The Police will be contacted if a criminal offence is suspected.
- If we are unclear on how to respond, or whether a criminal offence has been committed, the Online Safety Lead or a member of the safeguarding team will obtain advice through First Contact or Durham Police

g. Online Radicalisation and Extremism

- We will take all reasonable precautions to ensure that learners and staff are safe from terrorist and extremist material when accessing the internet on site. Sites are blocked using the Smoothwall Filtering System and regular Smoothwall Alerts (Daily, Weekly and Monthly)

are received by members of the Senior Leadership Team and the Strategic Network and IT Development Manager.

- If we are concerned that a child or parent/carer may be at risk of radicalisation online, the Online Safety Lead, Designated Safeguarding Lead or a member of the safeguarding team will be informed immediately, and action will be taken in line with our child protection and safeguarding policy.
- If we are concerned that member of staff may be at risk of radicalisation online, the Headteacher will be informed immediately, and action will be taken in line with the child protection and allegations policies.
