With that said, we wanted to take a moment to highlight the importance of good attendance wherever possible. Every single day in school really does count. When children are present consistently, they're able to build strong learning habits, keep pace with the curriculum, and feel confident in what they are doing. Just as importantly, regular attendance helps them stay connected socially — friendships, routines, classroom belonging and that sense of being part of something all grow with being here each day.

Of course, there will always be times when children are genuinely too unwell to attend, and rest and recovery are absolutely the right priority. We trust you to make those judgements, and we know families are doing their very best during a season when bugs seem to circulate faster than Christmas cards! However, we do sometimes see children missing school when they could still attend, and even small dips in attendance can add up over weeks and months. Coming to school even on less-than-energetic days helps children maintain momentum, prevents gaps from widening, and keeps them engaged with their learning and peers. We are always here to support you in making those decisions.

If you are ever unsure whether your child is well enough for school, please do reach out — a quick call to the office can help guide you. Likewise, if you're finding attendance tricky for any reason (health, anxiety, mornings feeling overwhelming, or anything else at all), please talk to us. We will always listen, and we're here to help find solutions that work for your child and your family.

Thank you for everything you do — Your partnership makes such a difference.

"Blackawton explorers"

Nursery

This week we stepped into the world of Goldilocks and the three bears. The children loved exploring the story through lots of activities. We had great fun

measuring, mixing and tasting our own porridge. The children created fabulous bear artwork and had fun playing in the messy oats and dressing up as bears and goldilocks, acting out the story.



Class 1

Class 1 had some special visitors on Thursday this week. Lucas and Reuben bought their quail chicks to school for the day and we enjoyed watching them eat, drink, scratch and snuggle under their heat lamp.



Class 2

Class 2 have been comparing in both English and maths.

In English we have written comparative sentences about the past and now.

In Maths we have been comparing numbers within 100 and ordering them. We have used compass points for cardinal directions and have developed ball control in netball and tag rugby.

Class 3

We have been learning about understanding our emotions and recognising the "inner animal" that represents how we feel and react. Whether our inner animal is calm like a tortoise or ready to roar like a tiger, we have been practising strategies to keep it steady and under control. Through discussion, role-play, and calming techniques such as deep breathing and positive self-talk, we are learning how to respond thoughtfully rather than react quickly. These skills are helping us become more confident, respectful, and resilient learners.

In PE, we have been exploring different positions in netball. We now understand the roles and areas of movement for positions. Working as a team to pass, intercept, and move into space has helped us build cooperation and tactical thinking. We are looking forward to putting our new skills into action in full games soon. It has been a busy and exciting week, and the progress the children are making—both academically and emotionally—is wonderful to see. We are proud of their effort, reflection, and enthusiasm for learning.

Class 4

Class 4 had a really fabulous day in London this week, packed with fun, curiosity and plenty of shared smiles.

The children loved exploring the Tower of London, spotting famous landmarks from the river during our boat trip and chatting together over breakfast on the train. Even the very *squished* tube journey turned into a moment of giggles and teamwork.

It was one of those days where you could really see the class supporting one another, strengthening friendships and creating memories we'll treasure for a long time.

Class 5

Class 5 have had the best week!

We started with a long walk to Washwalk farm. This was the second visit and was full of learning and fun once again. The children made soup from vegetables they harvested. They also lit fires and made their own charcoal. In the afternoon, they made Cob bricks and tried to build the tallest tower. It was muddy! On Tuesday, we had an amazing adventure to London and back. The children were an absolute delight to spend time with and we enjoyed learning about crime and punishment at The Tower of London. We discovered that the moat was used to grow vegetables during the war. After hopping aboard the Thames Clipper, seeing the sites and visiting the Leake Street Graffiti Tunnels, we were well and truly shattered.

School Celebrated in Devon Schools Publication for Leading the Way in Recycling

The spotlight has been shining brightly on Blackawton School this month, as we were proudly commended by Devon Resource Futures to be recognised by all Devon Schools, in a publication photoshoot for our outstanding commitment to recycling and sustainability. The recognition celebrates the hard work of our pupils and staff, who have embraced a proactive approach to caring for the environment and reducing waste.

Over the past year, our school has transformed the way we manage resources. One of our most successful initiatives has been composting green food waste from lunchtime. Instead of sending leftovers to landfill, the scraps now go straight to our compost bins, where they help to feed a thriving community of worms. This natural process produces rich compost that is used in our school gardens, teaching students about the full cycle of food and soil health.

We have also taken big steps in separating dry mixed recycling. Pupils have become experts at sorting paper, plastic, and cardboard, ensuring that as much material as possible is reused rather than thrown away. Carefully labelled recycling stations around the school make it easy for everyone to do their part.

Perhaps the most impactful achievement has been our work to minimise the amount of rubbish sent to the Energy-from-Waste plant. While this facility converts waste into energy, it still contributes to carbon emissions. By reducing our reliance on it, we are helping to cut down the school's carbon footprint and teaching pupils to think beyond the bin.

The recent photoshoot brought huge excitement—our children were thrilled to be recognised for their efforts and said they felt like celebrities. Their pride has grown alongside their understanding of how small actions can make a big difference to the planet.

We are incredibly proud to be leading the way in Devon and hope to inspire other schools to join us on the journey toward a cleaner, greener future. With passion, teamwork, and a shared sense of responsibility, our pupils have shown what true environmental leadership looks like.

HEAD LICE

Please check your child's hair!



Head lice have been reported in school. It is important to regularly check your child's hair for head lice.

The best technique is to use a head lice comb when the hair is wet, leaving in conditioner and combing the hair in sections. When the hair is wet, head lice cannot move so they are easier to comb out. Please note that they do not jump or fly, you can only catch head lice from head to head contact. If you find head lice, please treat appropriately: the wet combing technique eradicates the lice and eggs. This should be done every 3 to 4 days over a 2-week period to break the life cycle.

A farmer is traveling with a fox, a goose, and a sack of beans. He comes across a river with a boat, but he can only take one item with him at a time.


If he leaves the goose with the fox, the fox will eat it. If he leaves the goose with the beans, the goose will eat them. How does he get everyone across safely?

Road Safety Week < < < >

During Road Safety Week, our children have spent time learning how to keep themselves safe when travelling to and from school. We have practised important skills such as stopping, looking, listening and thinking before crossing the road, alongside discussing why it's safer to use crossings and walk on the inside of the pavement.

Children have also explored how to stay safe when cycling or scooting, including wearing a helmet and being aware of driveways and moving vehicles. In class, we have discussed how to spot potential dangers and make sensible choices.

You can support this learning at home by talking to your child about what they've learned, asking them to show you safe crossing techniques, and modelling good habits on your journeys together. Working as a team helps children build confidence and stay safe every day.

Simple ways to enjoy the festive season without overspending



Most children have the nasal spray vectine which is the preferred vaccine. A vaccine injection is also available which does not contain gelatine from pigs (porcine gelatine). For more information visit www.nhs.uk/child-flu

Should I keep my

child off school?



Until...

Chickenpox	at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over
Diarrhoea and Vomiting	48 hours after their last episode
Cold and Flu-like illness (including COVID-19)	they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to attend. Follow the national guidance if they've tested positive for COVID-19
Impetigo	their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hours after they started antibiotics
Measles	4 days after the rash first appeared
Mumps	5 days after the swelling started
Scabies	they've had their first treatment
Scarlet Fever	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics
Whooping Cough	48 hours after they started taking antibiotics

Hand, foot and mouth	Glandular fever
Head lice	Tonsillitis
Threadworms	Slapped cheek
