Purpose: To entertain

Remind children of the different sentence types: statement, question, or exclamation. Children write some sentences with different forms linked to an illustration from the book.

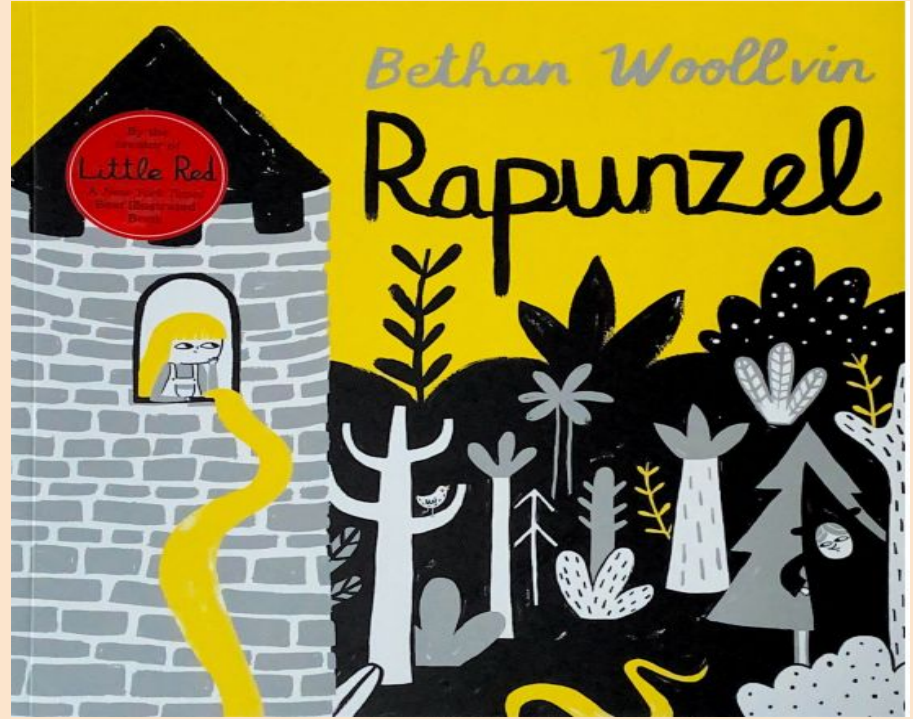

The thought of returning to the tower made her sad. It's a shame about that witch, she thought to herself.



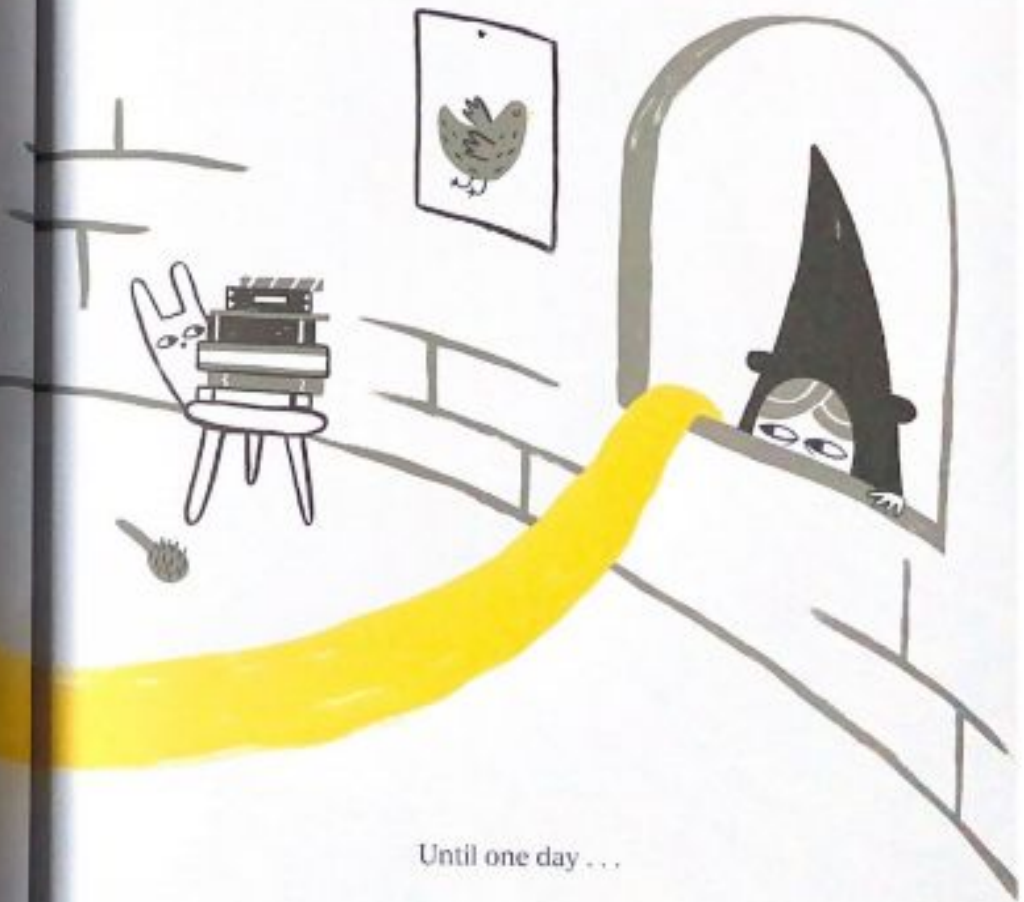


So Rapunzel made a plan.

Can you write a question about Rapunzel on your whiteboards? Remember capital letters and question marks!

What a scary witch she was!

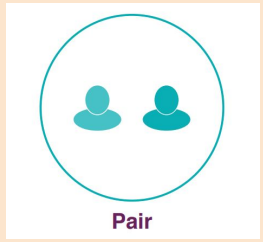
This is exclamation. They usually start with what or how.

Can you write a exclamation about Rapunzel OR the witch on your whiteboards? Remember capital letters and exclamation marks!

Brush your hair.

This is a command. It is a bossy instruction.

Can you write a command from  
Rapunzel OR the witch on your whiteboards?  
Remember capital letters and punctuation.
