★ Next Steps for Year 11 & Post 16 Leavers

As your young person prepares to take their next steps beyond school, we know this can be both an exciting and emotional time. This leaflet offers a starting point to help you explore the many pathways available. It's not a complete guide, but we hope it gives you confidence as you begin planning ahead. And remember—you're not alone in this journey.

Applications and College Visits

Families and learners are encouraged to take the lead in applying to colleges and arranging visits or transition activities. Most colleges offer easy-to-use online application forms, and many are happy to support you with any questions. If you're unsure where to begin, don't hesitate to contact the college directly—they're there to help.

17 Planning the Week: College and Beyond

Typical college placements at Post-16 and Post-19 run for three days a week. This leaves two additional days that can be filled with meaningful, enriching experiences. These might include further education, supported employment, volunteering, or community-based activities. Families play a key role in exploring and arranging these opportunities, and we're here to help signpost where we can.

Support from Social Workers

If your young person has a social worker from the Children with Disabilities Team, you may already be discussing transition options—including those available through adult social care. If you haven't yet had these conversations, we warmly encourage you to reach out to your social worker. They can help ensure all the right support is in place for a smooth and positive transition.

Choosing the Right College Pathway



Mainstream

Mainstream colleges offer varied courses and are increasingly inclusive, with many supporting Entry Level learners. They provide SEND support and can suit young people who benefit from structured learning and extra help. For those with more complex needs—like intensive therapy, personalised teaching, or specialist communication—a Specialist or Independent Specialist College may be more appropriate.



Specialist

As young people prepare for life after school, some families may explore specialist Post-16 education options. While these can offer highly tailored support for learners with complex needs, it's important to understand that Durham County Council will only support a placement in a Specialist or Independent Specialist College if it's clearly shown that no mainstream Post-16 option can meet the young person's needs. This means that all local mainstream further education providers must be fully explored and ruled out before a specialist placement will be considered.



Other?

Some young people aged 18 and over may not move on to further education—especially if they're no longer making progress in their current setting. At this stage, the focus shifts from education to planning for adult life.

If your young person has a social worker and receives support from the Children with Disabilities Team, they'll guide you through the next steps. A Navigations Social Worker will be introduced to help explore your young adult's care and support needs.

Durham County Council's Adult Social Care team will carry out a Care Act assessment to see if your young person qualifies for adult services—such as supported living, day opportunities, or respite care.

Post-16 Pathways for SEND Learners (Ages 16–24)

As your child prepares for life beyond school, New College Durham offers a welcoming and inclusive environment designed to support their growth, independence, and future aspirations.

Foundation Studies at New College Durham

New College Durham's Foundation Studies programme is specially designed for young people aged 16–24 with disabilities, learning difficulties, or challenges managing emotions or behaviour. The aim is to build confidence, independence, and readiness for adult life.

Each learner's journey is personalised, with support from a dedicated tutor and a curriculum tailored to their strengths and interests.

There are three specialist pathways to help learners progress at their own pace:

Pathway	Focus
Pathway 1	Preparing for Independent Living and Community Life
Pathway 2	Preparing for Further Learning or Employment
Pathway 3	Preparing for Working Life

EHCP and the Consultation Process

If your child has an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP), their transition to college will follow the statutory consultation process. This ensures that their needs are reviewed and matched with the right support and provision. The college works closely with families and local authorities to make this process smooth and transparent.



Open Campus & Life Skills Development

New College Durham is an open campus, which means students move independently between buildings and facilities. As learners grow older, it's important they develop:

- Personal responsibility for safety
- Confidence in navigating public spaces
- Skills for independent travel and time management

Staff support learners in building these skills gradually, with safety and wellbeing always a priority.

Post-16 Pathways for SEND Learners (Ages 16–24)

East Durham College offers a supportive and inclusive environment for young people with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), helping them build confidence, independence, and skills for adulthood.

What's on Offer?

1. Foundation Studies Programme

- Tailored for learners with EHCPs and additional needs.
- Focuses on life skills, employability, and personal development.
- Includes practical learning in areas like catering, horticulture, and animal care.

2. Supported Internships

- Real-world work experience with job coaching.
- Designed for learners ready to transition into employment.
- Helps build confidence and workplace skills in a structured, supported setting.

3. Preparation for Adulthood

- Emphasis on independence, travel training, and community engagement.
- Learners develop skills for daily living and future planning.
- Encourages social interaction and personal growth.

4. Bespoke Learning Plans

- Each learner follows a personalised timetable based on their EHCP.
- Small class sizes and specialist staff ensure individual support.
- Progress is regularly reviewed with families and professionals.



Who Supports the Learners?

- Experienced tutors and support staff trained in SEND.
- Access to speech and language therapy, occupational therapy, and counselling.
- Strong multi-agency collaboration to meet holistic needs.



Campus Environment

- Safe, welcoming spaces with sensory-friendly areas.
- Purpose-built facilities for vocational learning.
- Opportunities to mix with peers across different pathways.



Entry Requirements

Most learners join with an EHCP.

The college works closely with schools and local authorities to ensure smooth transitions.
