

Phase Three Phonics Knowledge Organiser




Previous learning - What I should already know:

Children are introduced to the sound each letter makes. As each set of letters is introduced, children are encouraged to use their new knowledge to sound out and blend words. For example, they will learn to blend the sounds s—a—t to make the word sat.

- To read VC/ CVC real words and alien words.
- To say initial sounds of objects.
- To read everyday words the, to, I, no, go, into
- To read simple captions.
- To form letters correctly.
- To write simple VC and CVC words.

Everyday Words I should already know:



Knowledge - What I need to know:

In this phase children continue to build their knowledge of letter sounds.

They learn consonant digraphs (sounds made up of two letters together such as 'ch' or 'll') and long vowel sounds (such as 'igh' or 'ai').

- To read VC/ CVC real words and alien [nonsense] words.
- To read everyday words me, be, he, she, we, was, you, they, all, are, my, give, live, by
- To read simple phase 3 captions.
- To write CVC words using phase 2/3 phonemes and digraphs.

How can you help?

- Share and enjoy books with your child. Encourage them to infer from pictures to develop their storytelling.
- · Practise reading real and alien words.
- Learn the phase 3 phonemes with them.
- Encourage your child to write simple words using the phase 3 phonemes.
- Read stories, spotting the phase 3 phonemes and everyday words.

Phase 3 Everyday Words



Vocabulary:

Rhyming

Explore what words sound like and develop an awareness of certain words which sound the same.

Syllables

Breaking a word into different parts [el-e-phant]

Phonics

A method of teaching children to read by correlating sounds with symbols (letters/ groups of letters).

Phoneme

A single unit of sound which can be made using 1 or more letters e.g. "b' 'ai' 'ee' 'igh'

Alliteration

A group of words start with the same initial sound, such as: sun, song, snake, star.

Blending

Putting the sounds in a word back together to read it.

Segmenting

The opposite of blending. Splitting a word into individual sounds, used for spelling and writing.

Sound Talk [blending and segmenting]

Children learn to hear all the sounds in words, not just the sound at the beginning. E.g. sound out the word cat "c-a-t". Immediately after, merge the sounds together and say the whole word: "c-a-t, cat".

Decoding

Breaking a word into different phonemes to help reading.

Our Everyday Words

A word that cannot be decoded through phonics. "We see the word; we say the word."

Alien/Nonsense Words

Made up words to check phonic decoding skills, e.g. zane, snoap

Digraph

Two letters which make one sound 'ee' 'ai' sh'

Trigraph

3 letters which go together to make one sound 'igh' 'air'

Phase 3 Captions

Can children read and write these captions?

Handwriting

In school we follow the Letter Join Handwriting Scheme. Through this we teach the children how to use exit lines on their letters. We will be focusing on the Phase 3 sounds but will also teach them various other letters during this time.

Here are some examples below:

Sound Buttons

Encourage your child to press underneath each separate sound, to develop their blending and segmenting skills [being able to confidently identify the separate sounds in words].
