## Subject Specific Vocabulary

compensation	Something, typically money, awarded to someone in recognition of loss, suffering or injury.
crucifixion	An Ancient form of execution in which a person was nailed or bound to a cross.
defendant	An individual, company, or institutions, sued or accused in a court of law.
jury	A body of people (typically twelve in number) sworn to give a verdict in a legal case on the basis of evidence, submitted to them in court.
magistrate	A civil officer who administers the law to deal with minor offences.
pillory	A wooden framework with holes for the head and hands in which offenders were formerly imprisoned and exposed to public abuse.
prevention	The action of stopping something from happening or arising.
sanctuary	Refuge or safety from pursuits, persecution or other danger.
trial	A formal examination of evidence by a judge.
vandalism	Action involving deliberate destruction of or damage to public or private property.
