Many of you may be familiar with ClassDojo, an online tool that teachers use to give out points to children. Children can earn points for their house team by showing positive behaviours at school such as persistence, helping others, teamwork, courage or respect.

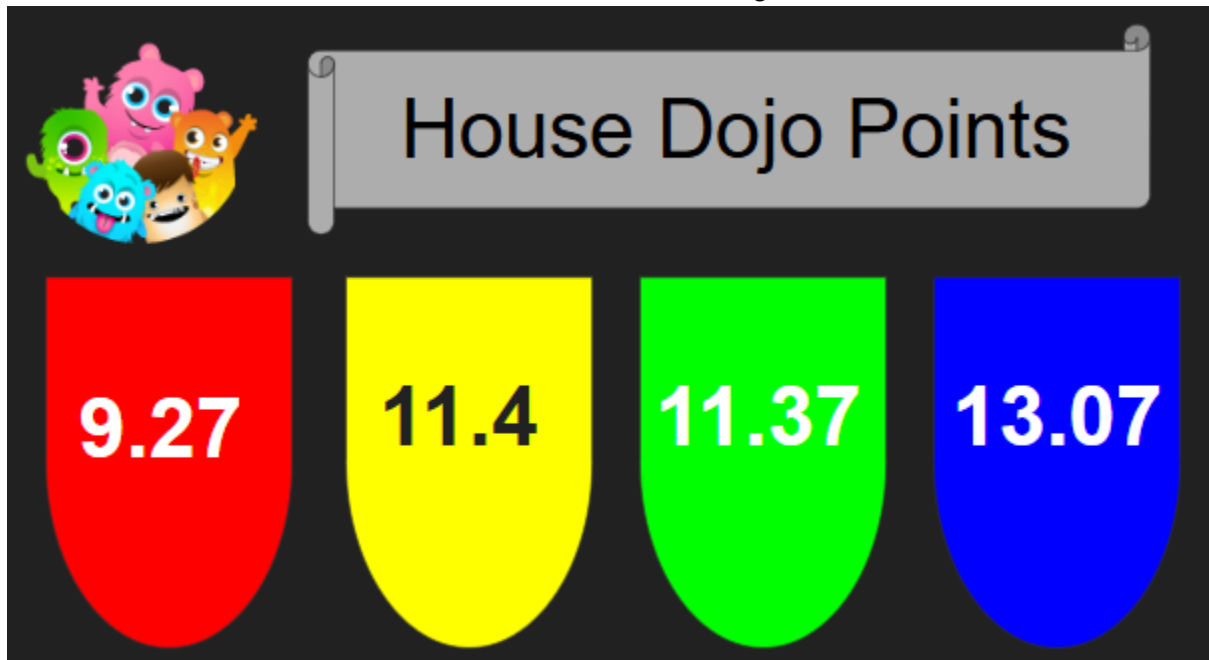


As a team we are keen to celebrate these positive behaviours which we see every day across our school community and so the children are now working towards a house reward at the end of each half term.

Collective Worship reflections

This week, we have introduced a new theme in collective worship, called Songs from the heart. We will be finding out more about one of the most famous song-writers of all time, who wrote much of the book called Psalms, in the Bible; a man named David. As well as these songs being really special for Jewish and Christian people (who share them in their holy books), the words David wrote are also very human – often a response to what was happening in his life at the time. So there will be ideas and emotions we can all identify with!

This week we have learned about David's work as a shepherd and his belief in God. We have listened to one of his most famous songs, Psalm 23 'The Lord is my shepherd' and shared the story of David and Goliath.

We have reflected on times in our own lives when we have needed to be brave or stand up for something we believe in and wondered how David's words might help us to stand up for what's right and fair, even when we feel small.

Y6 trip to Horniman Museum

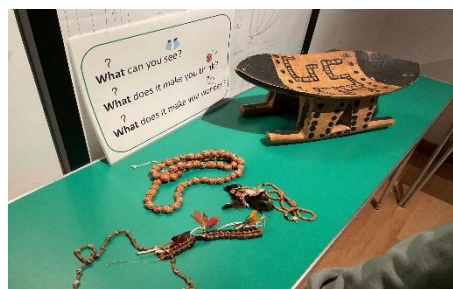
Last week, Year 6 enjoyed a trip to the Horniman Museum to enhance their geography learning this term. The children have started studying the Amazon



Rainforest, looking at the communities that depend on the forest and river, as well as its global significance. At the Horniman, they experienced a little of the humidity of a real rainforest whilst visiting the butterfly house and were thrilled to be able to observe up close the vibrant colours of some of the beautiful butterflies. They were also able to see for themselves some of the amazing creatures that live in and around the Amazon river when visiting the aquarium. Finally, the children enjoyed a practical workshop where they learned



more about the traditional ways of the Wai Wai tribe and examined some of the Amazonian artefacts the museum has. It was a thoroughly engaging day and really helped to bring the topic to life. Thank you to the parent volunteers who accompanied the class. We could not do these trips without you.

Winter water safety: stay safe, stay off the ice

A waterside walk on a crisp winter day is a popular activity. Here's how to make it a safe one:

Never go onto the ice.

Keep any children within reach and teach them not to go on the ice.

Keep your dog on a lead.

Stay away from the water's edge.

Watch out for slippery surfaces - ice, rain, fallen leaves and mud could cause you to slip into the water.

Stick to well-lit paths.

Wear shoes with good grip.

Follow the Water Safety Code



Stop and Think

Keep back from slippery banks and wear footwear with a good grip.

Stick to well-lit areas - the reduction in daylight in the winter adds to risks around water. Plan your walks in daylight or along well-lit paths.

Ice can be extremely vulnerable even during periods of prolonged cold. Never go onto the ice.



Stay Together

Keep children within reach and teach children not to go onto the ice.

Keep dogs on a lead near ice and slippery banks.

If out enjoying a winter walk, walk with friends.

In an emergency



Call 999

Call 999 – do not enter cold water or ice to rescue.

Try and reach them from the bank using a rope, pole, tree branch, clothing tied together or anything else which can extend your reach.



Float

Fall in or become tired - stay calm, float on your back and call for help. Throw something that floats to somebody that has fallen in.

If you cannot climb out, wait for help and keep as still as possible. Preserve heat by pressing your arms by your side and keep your legs together. Keep your head clear of the water.

Make sure the whole family knows basic water safety and what to do if they find themselves in the water unexpectedly. You can access FREE RLSS UK resources to help.
