Dear families,

It's incredibly important that students, families and staff feel a sense of belonging at Coombeshead and we are always working on developing the "Be nice" element of The Coombeshead Way via assemblies, lessons and by being role models. Lessons are calm and focussed and the vast majority of students are respectful, polite and are a delight to have in school. We have just had a week of lovely reward assemblies and sixty Year 7 students were nominated for "Cakes with the Head" for a wide range of lovely reasons with "Being nice" the main focus.

There has continued to be a big drive on supporting students to consider and understand the wide range of career paths that are available to them. We had mock interviews just before Christmas for Year 11, the BBC have visited school for a day to do active careers sessions with Years 7 to 10, we have had a careers fair for all students and are supporting National Apprenticeship Week. Year 10 are busy arranging their work experience week in July and we have had a large number of Year 13s submit their UCAS applications for university places with Year 12 just starting this process.

Year 11s sat their second set of PPE exams (mock GCSEs), their behaviour and conduct were outstanding, we have never seen such high levels of determination and focus. They are an incredible year group and have been working extremely hard in lessons and when revising at home. We are so proud of their attitude and the effort they are putting in; their future looks very bright!

To follow on from this success there is an information evening led by Mr Balsdon on Monday 24th February at 6pm in the theatre for Year 11 students and their families. The focus will be on how to revise and the journey through the exam season.

Students have been thriving with all our extracurricular activities such as sports clubs, performing and creative arts events and charity work. I was lucky to see a fantastic production of Aladdin led buy our Year 9 and 10 performing art students at Ipplepen Primary school last week. Our students spent the day at Ipplepen and taught the Year 5 students' songs, dances and lines to enable them to be part of the show. What an amazing level of talent and skill from our students. #### **EHE - ELECTIVE HOME EDUCATION**

Coombeshead Academy strongly believe the best place for students is in school, in front of expert teachers. This is not only the best option for their education, but for their social skills, mental health and to help them understand the wider world and build resilience. Therefore, we strongly discourage students moving to EHE.

#### Are you considering EHE – Elective Home Education?

While home education can work for some families, it may not always be the best option for your child's secondary education. The number of students being placed on EHE is rising rapidly, both nationally and within Devon. In addition, we are concerned about the number of students from Coombeshead Academy who have been placed on EHE this year.

EHE is often a response to a short-term concern such as your child falling out with friends, anxiety issues, worried about being taken through the attendance procedure or bullying. Parents often take students out of school short term to relieve the immediate issue, however, do not always have the skills or resources to formally educate their child in the wide range of areas and subjects they get at school.

Parents often plan to reintegrate their child back into their current school or, at times, a different school later in the year. This makes things much more difficult for the child as they miss significant sections of learning and then struggle when they go back into lessons as they have fallen behind. These students never fully catch up on this missed work and research shows students who have had periods of home education often do not perform well in their GCSE or A level exams. They quickly lose friendships, spend more time on social media and as a result anxiety can increase and mental health deteriorate.

If you are considering EHE please contact us straight away. We will do all we can to resolve your concern and even if you eventually chose to move your child to another school, its important they keep attending right up until the move. Here are some important reasons to consider before making a decision to move to home education:


#### **EHE - ELECTIVE HOME EDUCATION**

- Legal responsibility: As a parent, you'll be responsible for meeting all of your child's educational needs. This means delivering a well-rounded curriculum and ensuring your child reaches their full potential across various subjects. This requires a significant amount of time, energy, and effort from parents. Parents may need to cover costs for textbooks, computer equipment, sports activities, and any additional tutoring that may be needed. Additionally, exam fees for GCSEs and A-Levels can add up quickly, often totalling hundreds of pounds and finding a centre who accepts candidates for examinations can be very difficult.
- Gaps in knowledge: As a parent, you might not have expertise in every subject area, leading to gaps in your child's education and difficulty covering all necessary topics. This is especially difficult when they return to a school or sit external examinations.
- Social concerns and limited extracurricular opportunities: Home educated children may miss out on opportunities such as extracurricular clubs, school events, work experience, school trips and rewards for achievements through assemblies and award events. Your child might miss out on valuable social experiences with peers, which can impact their ability to interact in diverse environments and develop important social skills.
- Long-term educational impact: If you intend to home educate only for a short time, it could affect your child's readiness for future education and career opportunities. A traditional school setting often prepares students more effectively for higher education or the workforce.

Choosing the right educational path for your child is a big decision. We encourage you to consider all factors carefully to ensure you are making the best choice for their long-term success.

Please speak to us if you are worried, this can be your child's Year Team Leader, Student Support Officer, Mr Balsdon our Deputy Headteacher or myself as we are very keen to support out students and their families.

#### ATTENDANCE MATTERS - AVOIDABLE TERM TIME ABSENCE

It is important to remind parents/carers that, in line with the Government expectations on school attendance, we are unable to authorise avoidable term time absence including for holidays. We have recently sent home a letter outlining the reasons for this and the possible consequences for parents/carers if they choose to take their child out of school for avoidable reasons. Please do ensure that you are aware of the content of that letter and let us know if you did not receive it via email so that we can send you a copy directly. #### MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLBEING

At the start of February all students attended an assembly around promoting positive mental health as part of Children's Mental Health Week. The theme was 'Know Yourself, Grow Yourself'. The idea is that by knowing how we think, feel and act, we are better placed to have positive outcomes for our mental health.

To support students at Coombeshead, we have NHS trained Mental Health Ambassadors made up from our 6th Form students who are happy to work with students who are struggling with their mental health.

We have also set up an email address specifically for students who may be struggling with mental health. The email goes directly to the mental health ambassadors who will be able to respond to the student and arrange to catch up to talk through the issues that they are struggling with. - Don't keep it all to yourself and spend too much time in your own head. This can sometimes make it keep piling up, and make you feel worse.
- Talk to someone you trust and feel comfortable with— a teacher, parent, sibling, cousin, friend... if you can't think of anyone and need to talk, try talking to someone like Shout by texting SHOUT to 85258 for free.
- Write your thoughts and feelings down.
- Keep in contact with people, don't isolate yourself.
- Don't dismiss your feelings because you think they aren't valid. Everything you feel is valid and important to you.



- Focus on the good parts of your life and doing what you love, rather than the negative.
- If you feel like harming yourself then tell someone you trust and distract yourself in the meanwhile.
- Do something you enjoy to help you relex and have a break – watch a film, play a game, watch your favourite YouTuber, listen to music.
- Be your own best friend because at the end of the day, you're stuck with you so look after yourself!
- Remember that you're not alone, even if it sometimes feels like you are.

#### Here's what children and young people told us they need from you:

- We don't need to have 'one-off conversations about our mental health'
   sometimes a chat on a journey or at bedtime is enough.
- I need to know it's okay to talk to you about any and all of my feelings. Please hear what I have to say, without interrupting me.
- Please listen to me carefully and acknowledge how I am feeling it might seem silly to you but what I am going through is important to me.
- Playing with pets can make me feel better.
  Same with playing football, basketball or
  whatever type of sport I am into.
- Don't compare my experiences to your own when you were a child.
- Sometimes I just need you to listen and hear what I'm saying I don't always need answers (or lectures)
- Please don't worry about trying to fix things for me I often just need to know you are there for me and understand what I am going through.



If you are open with me about your feelings, this can help me to be more open about mine.

- Sometimes I don't want to talk. Please trust that I will come to you (or another grown-up or someone my own age) when I'm ready. Sometimes it's easier for me to talk to someone nearer my own age my siblings, cousins, friends, younger

#### STUDENT REFLECTIONS ON PERFORMING






#### POP-UP PHOTO EXHIBITION
