In Beech, this week we had a RWInc visitor to our class phonic sessions who, not surprisingly, was very impressed with the behaviour and learning of the children.

The children have made some super spiral pictures using craypas and have discussed the importance of 'saying sorry' with meaning when we have done something wrong. The Y1 children have finished off their feelings books; they concentrated really hard to write simple sentences using a capital letter and a full-stop.

We have also been looking at the different places in East Allington village- the park, village hall, football pitch, church, school, housing estates and pub- please see if the children can identify these places with you on your travels.

Hazel

We have had another fantastic week of learning and achievement. In English, the children have been working hard on their creative writing. We used the story *Gregory Cool* as inspiration, exploring how an author structures a narrative and develops ideas. The children then applied this to their own stories, producing some imaginative and thoughtful pieces of writing. It has been wonderful to see their confidence as writers grow, and to hear them share their ideas with the class. We have also begun exploring our new text, *Dare to Care*, *Pet Dragon!*, which has already captured the children's interest and sparked some lively discussions.

In PE, the focus has been on netball. The children have been putting into practice the skills they have been developing over the past few weeks, such as passing, spacing, and movement around the court. This week, they had the opportunity to play in real matches, and it has been brilliant to see their teamwork, determination, and sportsmanship shine through. The Year 4 children have particularly impressed us with the way they have shown leadership and encouraged their teammates – a big well done to them! Overall, it has been a busy but very positive week.

Willow

What a wonderful week it's been in Willow Class! We started Monday with a delightful surprise – madeleines baked by Amber, using a recipe card from our 'Sac à français'. Merci Amber! They were absolutely delicious.

In English, we have been hard at work on our explanation writing. Everyone has produced fantastic final pieces, packed with fascinating facts and a variety of writing techniques – we are so proud of the progress being made and can't wait to share these with the rest of the school.

Our class read, *Kensuke's Kingdom*, has kept us completely hooked. One highlight was enjoying a storytelling session outside in the sunshine on the field – a magical way to bring the book to life. Well done, Willow Class, for such enthusiasm, creativity, and teamwork this week!







Forest School Update

Hands on with History!

Our Forest School sessions this week have focused on building skills and exploring how people in the past worked with tools and materials.

- Beech Class learned about different types of hammer and their uses, gaining confidence in handling tools safely and effectively. One child even made their own mallet!
- Hazel Class began designing and making their own tools and weapons inspired by Neolithic technology, giving them a taste of how early humans shaped their world.
- Willow Class continued developing their self-directed projects. They learned how to make paracord nets using different knotting techniques, while also working on fixing and strengthening their structures to keep them safe and secure.

It's inspiring to see how each class is combining creativity, practical skills, and teamwork, while also connecting with the knowledge and resourcefulness of the past.



Maths Problem of the Week - Family fun!


Have a go at this mathematical thinking to get your maths conversations happening at home.





Should I keep my

child off school?

Yes

Until...

Chickenpox	at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over
Diarrhoea and Vomiting	48 hours after their last episode
Cold and Flu-like illness (including COVID-19)	they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to attend. Follow the national guidance if they've tested positive for COVID-19
Impetigo	their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hours after they started antibiotics
Measles	4 days after the rash first appeared
Mumps	5 days after the swelling started
Scabies	they've had their first treatment
Scarlet Fever	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics
Whooping Cough	48 hours after they started taking antibiotics
