# Free Breakfast Club Pilot

Starting on Monday, 28th April, we will offer a free breakfast club from 8.15 to 8.45 a.m. This is a wonderful opportunity for your child to enjoy breakfast with their peers and settle into the school day; we would love to see as many families as possible take up the offer.

#### Attending the free breakfast club

The breakfast club will be open to all pupils. We are asking that parents book in advance via our newly launched Arbor app. Bookings will open from **Wednesday 2nd April** and slots will be available for the remainder of the academic year. Please note, <u>bookings will close 48 hours before each session</u>; this is so that we can staff accordingly and ensure we have enough breakfast supplies.

From Monday 28th April, the school gates will open at **8:15 am**. Children will head into the school via their normal entrances, they will hang up their belongings and go straight to the school hall to enjoy a variety of breakfast options, such as cereal, toast, and fruit. We will be encouraging the children to be as independent as possible in serving their own breakfast and clearing away.

After eating, they will head to their classrooms where activities will be set up.

It is important that children accessing the free breakfast club <u>arrive promptly</u> <u>at 8:15 am</u> - as the school gates will close at around 8:20 am.

#### If your child is not attending the free breakfast club

The school gates will open again as normal at 8:35 am and close at 8:45 am. Children arriving after this time will be marked as late and will need to enter the school through the main office.

#### Our earlier paid-for breakfast club

Our earlier paid-for breakfast club will still be available from 7:35 am. However, in light of the free breakfast club starting at 8.15am, the paid-for provision will be reduced to £3.00

### Penguins



The Penguins have been buzzing with excitement and learning this term. The children have thoroughly enjoyed our novel study of 'The Tiger Who Came To Tea', culminating in a delightful tiger tea party. This engaging book has sparked curiosity about real tigers, prompting us to explore their habitats and diets. Our geographical skills were tested when we used atlases to investigate animals in various climates. The children's creativity shone through in their design and creation of animal puppets and in Maths, we've delved into the concepts of doubles, and explored 'odd blocks' and 'even tops'.

What a remarkable half-term it has been in the Koalas class! Our children have immersed themselves in learning all about animals and their habitats, looking at the characteristics of various animal groups. We welcomed some animal visitors with snakes, lizards, guinea pigs, and rabbits and also visited Stonehurst Farm and had a thrilling tractor ride! In English, we delved into 'The Tiger Who Came to Tea' and our Year 1 children wrote unique versions of the tale. We also worked on our nonfiction skills, compiling fascinating tiger fact files. In D&T, we have created animal puppets, with Year 1 children demonstrating their sewing prowess. It's been a truly enriching term, filled with hands-on learning and creativity!

# Sloths

In History, Sloths & Owls brought the Great Fire of London to life through drama and diary writing, culminating in a controlled burning of their handcrafted houses in the playground! Our English has been based on 'Amara and the Bats', inspiring fascinating nonchronological reports. In Science, we have investigated habitats and signs of life in our playground. We have been concentrating on measurement and data representation in maths while in music we have been learning the handbells for Year 1 and boomwhackers for Year 2.

The Owls' exploration of non-fiction, inspired by 'Amara and the Bats', has resulted in impressive reports that would rival even David Attenborough's work. In Maths, the children have delved into various measurement concepts, applying their knowledge to solve complex problems. Our PSHE curriculum has fostered a deep understanding of diversity, encouraging children to recognise similarities and differences within our community groups. Miss Evans is immensely proud of their progress and looks forward to seeing their curiosity grow in the summer term!



#### Leopards



Their engagement with 'The Fossil Hunter' has been incredible, as they have delved into non-fiction texts to hone their explanation skills. Our Maths lessons have been a source of immense enjoyment, particularly our unit on measures. Our budding scientists have also explored the fascinating world of rocks, conducting investigations into their properties. D&T lessons have sparked creativity, with children crafting special greeting cards using levers and linkages. Finally, our visit to Evington Valley Primary School in Leicester was a wonderful opportunity for our children to forge new friendships and create lasting memories.

We have had a fantastic, science-filled term! The children have been fascinated by fossils, learning all about them in science and even meeting Richard, a reallife fossil hunter, who shared some incredible specimens with us. They explored the properties of different rocks through hands-on investigations. We also enjoyed a brilliant workshop from Gazebo Theatre, which taught us how to live more sustainably by reducing, reusing, and recycling. All of this learning has linked beautifully with our class book, The Fossil Hunter by Kate Winter, where we discovered the inspiring story of Mary Anning, the first recognised female palaeontologist. It has been a truly exciting and engaging term of discovery!

#### Flamingoes





The Tigers have had a jam-packed half-term sorting fact from opinion when they were finding out how to write news articles in English. When

the Tigers met the animals they couldn't contain their excitement and

Mrs Spivey and Mrs Shore were immensely proud of how brave they were in stepping out of their comfort zone and holding as many animals as they could. We also had a fantastic time at Creswell Craggs sharpening our survival skills, adventuring into real Stone Age caves and becoming palaeontologists when they recreated some Stone Age animals!

## Quokkas, Foxes and Lions.



In art, our budding activists explored mono-printing techniques and created zines to convey powerful messages. Our PSHE curriculum has empowered children with essential financial literacy skills, preparing them for future responsibilities.

In science, the children have been delving into the properties of materials and the fascinating world of animals, including human biology. Whilst in our English and history lessons, we have moved from understanding a British and German point of view to studying 'Once' by Morris Glietzman - which offers a unique perspective on World War II through the eyes of a young Jewish boy.

In French, children have been mastering familial vocabulary, while our trip to the Mandir provided invaluable insights into Hinduism, its deities, and sacred spaces. A highlight for many was undoubtedly the animal handling session, where children had the opportunity to interact with an array of captivating creatures, from corn snakes to cockroaches.
