


Reception News

Wow! What a busy first term it has been in Reception. The start of this year looked a little different to previous years and the children had to come into class on their own from the very start. Although it took a few children a couple of days to get used to this, they now come in with confidence, ready for the day ahead. New friendships have been made and daily routines have been learnt.

We have worked with three class texts, Elmer by David McKee, We're Going on a Bear Hunt by Michael Rosen and Helen Oxenbury and the traditional tale, The Little Red Hen. Each story has provided plenty of activities for the children to do and they have produced some pleasing pieces of work. Here are some pictures showing you some of the things we have been up to.










We quickly started to learn phonics using RWInc phonics. The children have now learnt to read and write most of the Set 1 Speed Sounds. They have also been learning to use *Fred Talk*, which will help them to read and spell. Thank you to those of you who have been practising the letter sounds at home.

In maths we have been very hands on and have used a lot of different apparatus to help develop on our understanding of mathematical concepts. We have been matching numeral to quantity, where we had to count really carefully. We used balance scales to explain our understanding of heavier and lighter and we got to explore 2-step and 3-step patterns and used squares of paper to make our own. The children are working to understand the composition of each number.








Year 2 News






Year 2 have been so happy to be back at school! Even though things have been different, they've showed such eagerness to get back to their learning.


Year 3 News

The children have also showcased their design and building abilities, having studied different forms of dolls houses, followed by creating their own designs and culminating in constructing them. Here are a few that were made.








Year 5 News






