COVID19

Just as schools were getting back to running in a more usual way the Omicron variant has put us back a number of steps. December is usually the period when we have the most parental engagement, due to all the annual Christmas and end of term events, but unfortunately they have been derailed by new regulations again. I do hope that the events—whether smaller



scale than normal, virtual or recorded—have been enjoyed. Our first consideration has to be the health and safety of everyone involved at the school so I am sure you appreciate and understand the actions taken.

In one of our schools we have had to take action, based upon Public Health advice, that we would not want to take and that is close the school and children revert to remote learning. We all know the best learning is going to be with a teacher in front of a class of children. The sheer volume of cases made this difficult to do. There will be schools up and down the country that are struggling to deal with Covid related staffing absence, children testing positive and school leaders having to make decisions about their schools and classes. I am sure there will continue to be cases of Covid identified in our schools and we hope to minimise any impact on your child's attendance and their learning.

The Government's Plan B came into force this week. Whilst this is more general about public behaviour and actions we all need to do, the message is still the same about school. We know that the Government have said school closure will be last measure—schools will be the last to be closed and first to open. We all hope this is not a required action but the Headteachers have been making sure the schools are prepared for remote learning. Let us all hope it is not required.

SCHOOL BUDGETS

As we approach the end of the financial year, all the schools will be reviewing their spend this year in preparation to set the new budget for April. Once again there have been many challenges the schools have faced in dealing with Covid19 on top of the everything else. School budgets are expecting an injection of

cash from the Government, but as often is the case, the new money is already spent before it arrives in the school. Although a fictional graph, the money coming in is not matching the money going out resulting in overspends in the school. This is common throughout the country. Dersingham is in the best financial position currently as they are just about balancing their budget. They have worked very hard, having to make difficult decisions over the years to get to that position. At Central Park, previous healthy reserves have been eroded over the years as they get dipped into each year. Whilst there is no risk of the school going into deficit it does have to take actions to ensure this remains the case. At Calverton, unfortunately the school is already in a deficit. Officially this is not al-



lowed and has to have special approval. Therefore, the school will be looking at a variety of actions over the next couple of years to continue to reduce and eliminate the deficit position. A situation that is not going to be quick and easy to get out of but every action possible is being considered to achieve this.

A reminder that the schools are due to reopen on Wednesday 5th January. The calendar for 2021/22 and for 2022/23 will be on the school's website so do look ahead for other holiday periods.

FEDERATION AND CALVERTON



Calverton is expected to be the first school out of the three to be visited by Ofsted, as early as the Summer Term, and so in the coming months the Executive Team will be at the school more, building on current practice so we are in the best possible position for when we get our Ofsted call.

RECOVERING EDUCATION

ing extra work—even if they are still achieving what is expected of them. I am sure, like the teachers, you would be very happy if your child achieved more than expected.

Dersingham are contracting staff over the Christmas holiday to work with certain children. All schools will be setting different homework projects and work that can be completed at home. Your support is greatly appreciated in this. At the very least, children can still learn to read, learn their timetables and be writing about anything. Fluency in all these areas gives children a fantastic head start to their learning in school.

In the coming months I shall be looking in more detail at how the schools are spending their grants to help children achieve better and more. Some of the money will be spent to benefit all children in the school and some will be targeted. We want to



make sure that the grants are having impact and being spent in the most effective way.
