Choosing the subject you're passionate about

- Engagement and motivation: if you're passionate about the subject, it'll make it easier to stay focussed and succeed.
- Develop your knowledge: fully immerse yourself in learning and research, leading to personal and academic growth.
- Flexible modules: shape your degree around your specific interests.



Research is key

- Use the UCAS website: this is an excellent starting point. It allows you to search for undergraduate courses across UK universities.
- Explore University websites: visit the official website of universities you are interested in. You'll find comprehensive details about their courses, campus facilities and student life.
- Attend University Fairs and Open Days: gain first hand experience of what different institutions offer
- Assess entry requirements: do you meet the entry requirements?







Research the course

- **Curriculum:** review the topics covered. Does it match your interests?
- Modules: check if the course offers flexibility in module choices, enabling you to specialise in topics that appeal to you.
- Course delivery: look into the balance between lectures, seminars, practical and group work. Does the course offer a mix of teaching styles that suit your learning preferences?
- Industry links: does the course have strong connections with relevant industries
- Field trips: opportunities to gain realworld insights and practical knowledge.







Work placements

- Internships: often short-term positions within a company, typically lasting from a few weeks to several months.
- Sandwich placements: year long placements, usually taken between the second and third years of your degree.
- Location: they can be in Leicester, other UK locations or abroad.

Campus facilities

- Library: is it well-equipped with extended hours, access to digital resources and quiet study areas.
- Laboratories and specialised facilities: if your course is practical or research-based, check the labs, equipment and technical resources available to you.
- **Sports facilities:** on-campus gym, sports hall and fields.
- Social clubs and societies
- Spiritual services and prayer rooms
- On campus dining

Student Union

- Representation: Student Union represents their students' interests at the university, including issues relating to academic policies, campus life and welfare. Elected student officers ensure your voice is heard.
- Clubs and Societies: social and academic groups, or sports teams.
- Events and activities (including Freshers Week)
- Advice and Support: academic issues, financial support, mental health, housing and personal issues.





Sports teams and societies

- Join a community: become part of a vibrant student community, connecting with like-minded individuals who share your interests.
- **Explore new interests** continue a hobby or find a new one.
- Enhance your CV take on leadership roles or working within teams helps develop valuable skills such as teamwork and communication.







Accommodation

- **Cost:** check rent, additional frees and available payment plants.
- Room: room size, building condition. Ensure it's well-maintained and suitable for studying and relaxing.
- Communal spaces: you may wish to look for shared kitchens, lounges and study areas to support both socialising and academics needs.
- Location: is the accommodation close to your academic building and campus facilities?
- **Transport:** consider transport links and cost if required.
