




Home Learning in Reception

Year 1 News

Well done to Year 1 who are all remaining very motivated in their learning. Thank you to all parents who are supporting their children at home with each task. In school, children have been busy in their bubbles. With the hot weather, it's a very apt time to be learning about the rainforest. We used the book Rainforest Adventure to think about setting out on a rainforest trek.



In English, we have been thinking about rhyme. Children matched rhyming words, thinking carefully about the ending sound. They also thought about setting off on a rainforest adventure, what they would need and what they might experience on their journey. We were really impressed to see such rich description in the writing.

In science, we have continued finding out about animals and their habitats. Children have been sorting animals into different groups.





In maths, children have been busy doubling numbers. We have done this in a variety of ways, using number lines, pictures and even mirrors to show doubles.





In art, children looked at the very vivid colours you can see on some rainforest animals. We were happy to see so many well designed frogs using the children's own patterns and colours.









Year 1 News

The children in Year 1 are looking at Brazil this term, and particularly at the Amazon Rainforest. In the 1D bubble we created this rainforest board which also shows how the children have been learning to tell the time. We have been using watercolours and collage to make rainforest animals and carnival headdresses. We have also written Amazon acrostic poems.





We have learned about the origins of The carnival and discussed Rio's spectacular annual carnival! We made posters, masks and even learned some Samba moves! In science and geography, we have been exploring the rainforest, its layers and incredible animals!











Year 2 have continued to put an outstanding effort into their learning at home. As well as continuing their fantastic reading and maths work, the children have been learning about healthy eating. This included thinking about healthy food choices, making a healthy lunchbox and creating art related to healthy eating.









This week the focus has turned to plants! Children have been looking at different parts of plants and their functions.

Year 3 News

Year three have been working hard on learning about plants, volcanoes and musical instruments these last two weeks. They have worked hard to review their multiplication facts. Their adding and subtracting with money has really come along. In addition, they have done a variety of extra home learning, in particular writing some lovely book reviews and practising their art skills.















Year 5 News

The last couple of weeks have been busy for Year 5 children. As well as the usual English and maths tasks on the learning platform, we have seen some fantastic learning in many other areas too. Our history topic this term has been Crime and Punishment through the ages. The task over the last couple of weeks was to find out how Tudors treated their criminals. The children had to find out all about different torture devices and then produce a piece of work to show what they had learnt about. We received a mixture of power points and posters and it was extremely clear the children had put a massive amount of effort into the work – despite it being a pretty gory topic!







Beheading

This is probably one of the most famous punishments of all time, it was a terrible thing. Executioners normally had to take several blows at the neck before lifting it by the hair and showing it to the crowd. The most terrifying aspect of it was that the head remained conscious for 8 seconds!

Our Geography topic has been focused on the needs of humans and the planet. We have found out about where our power comes from and this week have been thinking about where all our food comes from and about the idea of a carbon footprint. We have also been considering how our actions impact on other people around the world – particularly when importing and exporting food. The last geography task has focused on looking at food around our homes and finding out where in the world it comes from. We calculated our 'food miles' and thought about the benefits and risks of importing food from abroad and decided whether or not it was a good thing to do.

I believe that we should continue importing food from abroad. Many countries rely on the UK to import their produce otherwise, they will not get paid. However, importing food from abroad is a debatable matter. The increased air traffic results in high levels of pollution which can impact the hotter countries which produce the food as the water will become scarce and the soil prone to erosion.



Year 6 Home Learning News





Childcare Bubbles

We have had bigger bubbles this past couple of weeks and the children have been busy keeping up with their learning platform tasks and also doing activities related to a 'theme' each week. We spent one week thinking about rivers and boats and enjoyed making magnet fishing games, painting some canal style art, learning to tie knots in ropes and doing a boat-themed scavenger hunt.

The second week was all about minibeasts. We started the week off by going on a minibeast hunt and discovered that across the school we have a variety of different bugs and insects that live in the different habitats around the school site. Also, we built 'bug hotels' and made 3D minibeasts out of a selection of different recycled materials.

We spent the third week thinking about plants and flowers.

We planted cress seeds and decorated pots to then plant marigold flowers in. We also had fun creating a mural painting of sunflowers and other plants on the wall near the small football pitch – thanks to Ms Tait and Miss Rees

for their help with this. We made collages of flowers using pulses and dried beans and pressed flowers and leaves and made bookmarks with them.















We look forward to the next three weeks and our new themes.




Online Library Service
