If your son/daughter cycle to school it is essential that they have and use a bike lock.

At Wigston College bikes can be locked up in the bike shed at the side of the College or in the Year 11 bikes shed, which is located behind gates locked between 8.30am and 2.55pm.

At Wigston Academy (Years 7 - 10) bikes can be locked up at the bike stands at the side of Site A, these are then kept behind locked gates during the school day from 8.30am to 2.55pm, or the area at the front of the Academy which is covered with CCTV.

Year 11 students can lock their bikes up in the bike shed at Wigston College, which is located behind locked gates during the school day from 8.30am to 2.55pm.

However, given the number of after school activities and clubs that are held across the campus including external lettings, these gates are sometimes open after school. Ideally lock your bike during the school day behind the gated area.

The police further advise:

- Lock your bike with your own lock, one lock for each bike.
- Make sure the lock is a D lock or lock that is not easily cut the police website will provide more advice.
- Insure your bike, it is unlikely that a bike will be insured on a normal household policy, even if it says other belongings. Bikes often need separate insurance.

The Trust is unable to insure bikes left on campus through its own insurance.

School Bus



The school run a bus service for students and travel must be paid for in advance, via the online payment system. Students will have unlimited use of the bus during the period their pass is valid and will be able to use the morning and afternoon service. We no longer offer a daily or single trip ticket and the current cost for using the bus is £20 per week. This covers any and all journeys on the bus. Students will be issued with a bus pass and they will be required to show this to the driver for every journey. Students who do not have a valid pass will not be eligible to use the school bus and will therefore be refused access to the service.

If you wish your child to use the school bus please visit our school website and under the parent tab you will find the information about our bus service, routes and details on how to purchase a bus pass.

Year 11 Maths Past Paper Practice

A plethora of research suggests that the more exposure to and practice of exam questions that students have, the better they will do in their live exams. One of the ways in which we are increasing the exposure and practice for our Year 11s is through the setting of past exam papers and use of walkthrough videos and shadow papers.

Starting this term, all students will be completing past paper practice homework which is compulsory whilst Sparx homework will remain optional in the background.

Each week, students receive either the odd or even numbered questions from a past paper. Students are expected to complete this to the best of their ability in black or blue ink. Once they have done this, they need to scan the QR code on the front of the paper and use the walkthrough video to mark what they have done. Anything that they got incorrect or weren't able to do should be corrected or answered in a different colour –purple ideally. Any topics/questions that students feel that they need extra practice on should be revised and practiced further through the use of Sparx codes that are on the front of their paper.

Papers are due **EVERY WEDNESDAY**. Any student who has not completed their homework or failed to bring in their paper will be given an **after-school detention on Thursday** so that they can complete their homework. If anyone has any issues completing homework or can't access the internet to use the QR code, a reminder that C1.5 computer room is open every day at lunchtime for students to use and is also staffed by maths teachers Tuesday to Thursday.

Students will then be sitting the shadow paper of their homework during one of their follow up lessons. These are the same style questions but different numbers. This gives them the opportunity to check that what they have learnt from the walkthrough video and Sparx has worked and that they can now answer every question. These will mostly be marked in class.

If students engage in this process, then they will see their scores continue to improve and give themselves the very best chance of reaching their potential and gaining the grades that they want or need.

We look forward to working together to see what amazing grades we can achieve.






ADT

Year 7 have been looking at drawing in perspective and below shows some of their work using central perspective and one point perspective.














ADT Graphics








COLLEGE UPDATE

UCAS Applications 2024

Year 13 students have now submitted their applications for degree courses starting in September 2024. Around 75% of Year 13 students have applied to universities, which remains in line with previous years' applications. Students are currently receiving offers of places and some are already in a position to confirm their first and second choice decisions. The local option for higher education is still the most popular choice for our students – De Montfort, Leicester and Loughborough are top choices followed by universities in the East and West Midlands regions. The most common courses applied for are social science subjects (Psychology, Sociology, Criminology and Law) which reflects our most popular A level courses. However, across the cohort, students have applied for a wide range of course including engineering, medicine, pharmacy, cyber security, music technology, architecture, animation, physiotherapy, sports science and primary teaching plus much more! Once course choices are made, students will begin the process of arranging accommodation and securing student loans. Support continues to be available to students as they finalise their plans, with Life Skills lessons lined up to cover Clearing and how to prepare for the first term at university.

Year 11 Applications to Wigston College

We have now reached the applications deadline of 31st January and we appear to have received a similar number of applications as last year's record numbers. Applicants are being contacted so that they can attend interviews with the Sixth Form Team; these will take place between the end of January and March.

Following the interview, successful applicants will receive their offers of a place for the academic year 2024-2025. All applicants will receive information that explains each stage of the process and we anticipate a strong cohort of students enrolling with us in August following the publication of GCSE results. If you are ever unsure of anything please do not hesitate to get in touch and a member of the Sixth Form team will be more than happy to speak to you.

We would like to take this opportunity (and many others to come!) to wish all of our Year 11 students the very best with their studies as we enter the final run up to the summer examination season.

Academic Calendar

Less than 10 College weeks remain until the summer examination season gets under way.

Students with live exams should be in full swing in terms of their revision plans (and actual revision!) in preparation for these. All students have had input from our Academic Mentor Mrs Dobney. If anyone is still unsure on how to revise or plan revision please speak to a member of staff for support and guidance.

Year 12 PPEs or mock examinations are scheduled to take place at the end of April. These are a great opportunity for students to see what knowledge has stuck and where they may need to focus their efforts moving forward. These are just a mere 9 weeks away. Revision should be a continuous activity that is built in throughout a student's journey if information is to be truly locked into their long-term memory, not an activity that is done at the last minute.

Here's what children and young people told us they need from you:

- We don't need to have 'one-off conversations about our mental health'

 sometimes a chat on a journey or at bedtime is enough.
- I need to know it's okay to talk to you about any and all of my feelings. Please hear what I have to say, without interrupting me.
- Please listen to me carefully and acknowledge how I am feeling it might seem silly to you but what I am going through is important to me.
- Playing with pets can make me feel better. Same with playing football, basketball or whatever type of sport I am into.
- Don't compare my experiences to your own when you were a child.
- Sometimes I just need you to listen and hear what I'm saying I don't always need answers (or lectures)
- Please don't worry about trying to fix things for me I often just need to know you are there for me and understand what I am going through.

If you are open with me about your feelings, this can help me to be more open about mine.

Sometimes I don't want to talk. Please trust that I will come to you (or another grown-up or someone my own age) when I'm ready. Sometimes it's easier for me to talk to someone nearer my own age – my siblings, cousins, friends, younger teachers at school - because they 'get it'.



WHAT IS MENTAL HEALTH?

SIGNS TO LOOK OUT FOR

There are lots of different ways that poor mental health in young people can present.

This includes;

- · Crying more than usual or persistent sadness
- Disrupted sleep patterns
- · Difficulty in concentrating
- Losing interest in friends and other things they like doing
- · Being reluctant to talk
- Irritability and aggression, particularly if this includes unprompted outbursts.
- Changes in appetite or rapid weight loss or weight gain.
